

## Why Holy Week is So Special to Christians

Well, we've reached the end of the Lenten Season and Holy Week is upon us. It starts with Palm Sunday and continues with Maundy Thursday and Good Friday . . . All on our way to the biggest day in Christendom: Easter Sunday. But what's the big deal . . . Why are these days leading up to the Easter party so special? I thought I would take a few moments to teach about each of these.

Palm Sunday. Did you notice that *actually*, we don't just call it "Palm Sunday" anymore? We call it Palm/Passion Sunday. That shift occurred a handful of decades ago now. Church leaders across denominations took what was intended to be a celebration of Jesus entry into Jerusalem and, recognizing that many people don't come to hear the reading of the Passion on Good Friday, decided to incorporate it on the Sunday before—when more people would be present. But also, theologically, the change recognized that Jesus entered Jerusalem in triumph (people waving palms and shouting "Hosanna") but that "triumphant entry" was overshadowed (or at least was lurking in the background) by the fact that he arrived for one reason: to die for us. Our worship, therefore, reflects the celebration of the day, but also the truth of the Messiah.

**Maundy Thursday**. "Maundy" is derived from the Latin word, *Mandatum*, which means commandment. On this night we read the story set during the Last Supper where Jesus gives his disciples, and us, a new commandment, that we love one another as we have been loved. At St. Philip's we try to emphasize the intimacy Jesus is calling us to have with God and one another by experiencing the giving of the commandment and the giving of body and blood in small groups by candlelight. We slow down to experience the God who was born into the world so he could show us the depth of God's love. That is impactfully felt as the sanctuary is "stripped" at the close of the service, symbolizing the move ever closer to the cross.

**Good Friday.** This is probably the most solemn day of the Christian year. As the passion is read during the Tenebrae service, the lights are dimmed and darkness falls as the light of the world is snuffed out. Music and scripture draws us right into the tomb with Jesus. And there we are left in darkness until Sunday morning.

These worship services set the tone for why on Sunday morning we greet one another with "Christ is Risen... He is Risen, Indeed!" - it is because if you can imagine a world without our Christ, it is darkness. Embracing that in worship brings us to the true joy of Easter Sunday. That we need Christ to bring us to resurrected life. We need Jesus to be our true light. And for all the things in life that leave us in darkness... We look to the empty tomb as witness to what Jesus invites us all into. Have a blessed Holy Week and a Happy Easter!

I am sure you, like me, have had moments or reoccurring themes in your life where you've expressed extreme frustration. You might say things like "if I had a dollar for every time (insert said frustration here), then I would be rich!" A number of instances come to mind when I apply this thought to my day to day work tasks. There are instances where I have to step away from the computer in complete irritation before I finish crafting an email that removes the emotion and just sticks to the facts at hand. "If I had a dollar for every time I had to explain this, I would be rich" I can also relate to this on the home-front when considering the number of times I ask my children to pick up their toys or put their plates in the sink. 


#### Ministries outside St. Philip's




## **Spring Book Discussion Sponsored by the Racial**

Easter will come, and then in a flash, it will be over. Or perhaps not? How long <u>will</u> our Easter last this year? In that one short day, April 9<sup>th</sup>, there will be Easter egg hunts, children ransacking Easter baskets, and worship services filled with excitement and congregants dressed to the nines! Eating is sure to begin at the crack of dawn as we share the yummy Youth Easter Breakfast followed by our individual family celebrations shortly thereafter. Won't it be wonderful to share a feast and catch up with those we love? All the while, we'll be wishing this day of celebration could last longer than just one day.

As luck would have it, Easter doesn't have to end on April 9th! This year our Easter season continues until its finale on Pentecost—May 28<sup>th</sup>. What if we spend those seven weeks reminiscing about Jesus's sin-free life, how he died to atone for all our sins, and what he did after his glorious resurrection? It's true that Jesus completed God's plan for our salvation, but let's not stop remembering just yet. Jesus spent time visiting with his beloved disciples and followers. He first said to Mary and the other women at his tomb, "Don't be afraid." He also appeared to his disciples and friends many times, assuring them that he was alive and they were not alone.

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you!' After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord. Again, Jesus said, 'Peace be with you!

As the Father has sent me, I am sending you.' (John 20:19-21) After his suffering, he presented himself to them and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God. (Acts 1:3)

Jesus also gave the disciples guidance for the future. Before he ascended to heaven, he told them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And, surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:18b-20) What a comfort this must have been for His disciples!

This story is a great comfort for me, too. To know that Jesus will be with me forever brings peace and calm into my life, no matter what is happening. We are so blessed to have the assurance that we are never alone; we are always in the loving arms of our Lord. Many times, the struggles of this world weigh us down, but, with the confidence that Jesus will always be with us, we can face anything. Sometimes, Jesus comes to us through friends and family. We are the hands and heart of Jesus in the world, sharing his love and peace with others, not just on Easter, but "always to the very end of the age."

## Taking Measurements



What do mathematics, emotions, and homemade playdough have in common? Last month they were the center of discussion at the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center. Center Youth Services Coordinator, Teresa Allen, says some elementary school scholars began their math studies with money. "Our 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> grade learners got to work with money, learning the names of coins and their value. They learned to add, subtract, and compare greater and less than concepts through fun engaging games and activities."

Meanwhile, Teresa says older learners concentrated on social learning and their emotions. "We talked thru and played games, so that the youth would be able to identify consequences of their actions and understand how people can have opposing opinions about the same topic or incident." Sounds like an excellent exercise for adults too!

Lastly all the youth used play dough to learn about measurements. "The children worked in small groups using various sizes of measurements such as cup, tablespoon, & teaspoon. They customized their dough with food coloring and glitter. What a fun month!"
