

#### Just a Few Updates . . .

Since we were close to the end of the program year, I thought I'd use my space in this newsletter to give you a few updates about things happening behind the scenes at St. Philip's.

First, I know many of you want to know the status of the call process for a new associate pastor. Well, it has been quiet, overall. The call committee has not received any new names of anyone from the Bishop. However, I have been in conversations with a potential candidate, who would like to be considered here. This person is currently in a call and would like to move and is excited about the possibility of coming to St. Philip's. I'm trying to get them to the point where I can introduce them to the call committee, but things definitely will not officially move forward with this person until the summer. In the meantime, things are going well with just one pastor. Sometimes it gets hard when there are multiple commitments that I need to a part of at the same time. But, other than that we are all doing very well.

Second, you are going to see some improvements to the livestream capability. Now, without a doubt, the preference is for us to be worshiping in person—after all, community runs on being physically present with one another. I like phone calls from my son checking in from college—it's something—but it doesn't replace when he comes home and spends time. The same is true of our church community. Nevertheless, our ability to livestream really has helped with folks who truly cannot make it to worship, who are out of town, and who are just unable to be present for whatever reason. They are still part of this community and are never far from our hearts. So, Stephen Benscoter, and a handful of our members have been working on upgrading our livestream capability to include a second camera which was donated last fall by one of our loving members . . . Thank you so much for that gift!! That will make changing "scenes" or camera angles must smoother. Also, Stephen is working on making it possible for hymns and other images to be displayed on the livestream so that those at home can see more of what we are doing in worship. Thank you Stephen, for heading that work up.

Finally, we are going to updating our lighting in the sanctuary—now the fixtures will stay the same, but the ability to dim, brighten, and do different lighting "settings" will be able to be done from an iPad tablet . . . Very cool. Stephen and Louise James are heading up that work too.

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Stephen Ministers are individuals right here in our church, St. Philip's, who are trained to journey with and pray with you during times of transition, loss, grief, illness, confusion/indecision, or hardship. On Sunday mornings you'll see them with the special blue name tags indicating that they are Stephen Ministers.

The reality of life is that we all need someone to vent and talk with in times of trouble. We need people to talk with to help walk with us toward renewed joy and life. And one pastor or two pastors simply are not enough to "be there" all the time through prolonged situations. Plus, when Jesus called us to love one another as we have been loved, he didn't mean to hire someone to do for us what we are uncomfortable doing for ourselves. Pastors will still care for us—of course they have specialized skills and of course they will be there!!! But Stephen Ministers minister to only one person, connect weekly, are available to talk to at a moment's notice, and hold everything in confidence.

"Hot tempers cause arguments, but patience brings peace." – Proverbs 15:18

We all face situations that try our patience on a daily basis, the kids are bouncing off the walls, you're stuck on hold with customer service, and the Wi-Fi is painfully slow. When times are stressful, it is even more difficult to persevere with a good attitude. Sometimes that "Keep Calm and Carry On" poster just isn't enough to calm your nerves and get you in a better mind set. Sometimes at the height of your frustrations you will read an uplifting quote or watch a short funny video that is meant to lift your mood. Does this typically bring you back down to earth and re-center you? Or are you like me, and just need 5 minutes of complete solitude to yourself? #### DEATH PENALTY BILL SUBMITTED IN DE LEGISLATURE

Representative Sean Lynn has introduced a bill in the State Legislature which would ban the use of the death penalty in Delaware.

The state does not currently have the death penalty because a few years ago the law which covered it was ruled unconstitutional by a judge. Following a case from Florida that had gone to the Supreme Court, the judge ruled that the Delaware law gave too much discretion to the judge and was thus not allowable.

Representative Lynn wants to make sure that the use of the death penalty will not come back to the state. His proposal requires life imprisonment without the possibility of parole for a person over eighteen years of age who is convicted of first-degree murder.

Lutherans are not necessarily pacifists, so we would not argue in principle that the state never has the power to take life. However, the Lutheran church has usually taken the position that state-sponsored violence (i.e. war, capital punishment) should be used rarely if at all.

The ELCA has a Social Statement (long-standing, adopted already in 1991) which says that "Capital punishment focuses on retribution, sometimes reflecting a spirit of vengeance...capital punishment makes no provable impact on the breeding grounds of violent crime...We would be a better society by joining the many nations that have already abolished capital punishment...we urge the abolishment of the death penalty."

The statement also makes the point that capital punishment is rarely used equitably. The rich, in murder trials, seldom face the death penalty; the poor often do.

Do you have an opinion about this bill? Your legislator would like to know.



We have had several "field trips" including a trip to the National Museum of African American History & Culture and the "Underground Railroad" tour. We have read and discussed several books and had guest events and speakers including a screening of the movie "One Small Visit". We have collaborated with Unity Lutheran Church on several events and are building a relationship with that congregation.

This has been a great educational experience for me and many others. I have come to realize that I knew very little about the struggles of the minorities in this country. I knew very little about slavery and the aftermath of this evil institution. I have become much more aware of my own biases and shortfalls in this important area of personal growth.

I realize now that it is not good enough to just ignore our history and accept the status quo. We as Christians need to speak up when we see any group of people that are being treated unfairly. We need to be intolerant of racially biased and bigoted speech and actions in our society. We need to examine our own speech, thoughts and actions, not allowing ourselves to hold racially biased or racist viewpoints. And we need to ask God to help us to be accepting of those with different backgrounds and different views on how to make this society better. We need to be a voice of acceptance and of God's love for all people!

We often hear that every day is a little Easter because we should be celebrating the resurrection every day. I think we should celebrate Pentecost every day, as well. Pentecost recounts the time when the Holy Spirit came to the apostles fifty days after the resurrection.

<sup>1</sup> When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. <sup>2</sup> Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. <sup>3</sup> They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. <sup>4</sup> All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them. (Acts 2:1-4)

God's timing was perfect, as always. Jews from all over the known world were in Jerusalem, celebrating one of the three pilgrimage festivals in the Jewish calendar. During Shavuot, all men were supposed to come to the temple in Jerusalem to worship and sacrifice. This festival was to celebrate the wheat harvest, as well as the giving of the Law. Because the Holy Spirit entered the apostles and made it possible for them to preach in the languages of the pilgrims, many people came to believe in Jesus Christ that day. Three thousand were baptized and became believers in Jesus as the Messiah and Savior.

It seems like "The Acts of the Apostles" should really be called "The Acts of the Holy Spirit, Working through the Apostles and Other Believers." The entire book follows the Holy Spirit, who enables believers to preach, teach and perform other acts, which brings the message of Jesus and the resurrection to others. Then, the Spirit enters those hearers, gives them faith and then enables them to share the message with others. The early church lived the command that Jesus had given them, to love one another and love their neighbors.

<sup>42</sup> They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. <sup>43</sup> Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. <sup>44</sup> All the believers were together and had everything in common. <sup>45</sup> They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. <sup>46</sup> Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, <sup>47</sup> praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

The Holy Spirit is still working today, every moment of every day. The Spirit is in each one of us, enabling us to share the good news of the resurrection. We are enabled and encouraged to share God's love and grace with others. The Spirit wants us to be God's hands and heart in a broken, hurting world.

#### Grants and Self Esteem

It's only April, but planning has begun for this year's Summer Camp at the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center. A key aspect of that planning occurred this spring as the Hilltop Center



was awarded a \$36,000 grant from the United Way of Delaware for the Governor's Fellowship Program. Hilltop Executive Director, Michelle Williams, reports "This program will expand summer learning opportunities for elementary and middle school students who may not have access to high-quality summer learning experiences. The program will also provide 2

additional support staff."

In addition, a couple of months ago we told you about a new jobs program proposed at the Center to train interested area residents to drive forklifts. While the training simulators are quite expensive, fear not. Michelle reports the cost was recently paid by another timely grant.

"The City of Wilmington will cover the cost of the two forklift simulators (\$54, 991) up front. I will complete an orientation in the coming weeks and once that is completed, onboarding for the Simulator Forklift training program will begin. We are looking to begin the first cohort in June." Staytuned.

Another topic we discussed earlier this year was the Barbershop operated as a training center at Hilltop. Center Deputy Director, Brandon Furrowh says the program is having a very direct impact on area residents.



"On the very first night of our new efforts, one of our long-standing parents brought back his three sons to get haircuts. As the boys entered the building," Brandon reports, "the father expressed to the staff... that this service was a huge blessing to him, because he had just lost his job in the previous week. Before becoming aware of the barbershop services offered

here at Hilltop, he wondered how he was going to financially manage getting haircuts for all of his sons."

Later, Brandon says, Hilltop was noted in social media by a follower who posted, "'Is there anywhere in Delaware where I can get a child's haircut for less than \$40.' It is evident that this program is really helping to alleviate some of the financial burden of our families, while boosting the self-esteem of the participants."

Congratulations on the grants and the efforts at building self-esteem, so badly needed these days.


