

Small Groups Re-Visioned for the Fall!!


So, we have come to the end of another program year here at St. Philip's. Other than our ongoing ministries like Family Promise and Grocery Club and other than the summer concerts we have later this month (see next page), we enter into a time when things slow down quite a bit here . . . That is, at least on their face, the ministries seem to slow down. Did you know that since the Spring, most ministries have already been knee deep in planning for the Autumn months? It's true . . . You might have been living through the Easter Season and looking toward Pentecost, but most ministry teams were looking toward Rally Day and Fall/Winter Planning.

One of the things I am very excited about is the revisioning that has been done surrounding Small Group Ministry here at St. Philip's for the upcoming program year, which starts in September. If you are new to St. Philip's, Small Groups have been over the last two decades one of the premier adult programs here at St. Philip's - at least in regards to the *Making Disciples* portion of our Mission Statement. The idea behind Small Groups is that by immersing ourselves in God's Word alongside other people of faith, we grow in our understanding of who God is for us, we grow in understanding who we are as people called into Christian community to love and serve one another, and we grow in what we are able/willing to give as we *Praise God* and *Serve the Community* together.

This year Small Groups will feature four sessions with four distinct topics - you do not need to commit for the entire year, but you are welcome to do so. The topics are: Water in the Bible; Biblical Meals/Hospitality; the Holy Spirit; and the Resurrection. But beyond the learning, we want to provide more opportunities for groups to fellowship with one another and we want to strengthen our ability to pray with and for one another. Because that fits our goals for these groups: learning, fellowshipping with each other, and praying with and for each other. In that way, you will get to know people better and we'll be able to support one another as well. And we do that all within the context of learning about God's grace in our study.

If you have questions about Small Groups, let me know and I'd be happy to share more about them. I'm so excited to be a part of this ministry once again and I can't wait for us to launch into another great year of this great program.

From the President **Gerry Butler**

Do you ever think about why you attend service each Sunday? Do you ever think about why you come to St. Philip's in particular? Is it for spiritual growth, fellowship, a community connection, or maybe the singing, or our wonderful Pastor?

My list of reasons could go on and on. But I think, for me, the most important one is that when we are in this building together, I feel a certain presence and closeness to our Lord, Jesus Christ. And, when we leave, I feel renewed with a right spirit and willingness to serve in any way.

However, there were many years when I did not feel this way. I attended a church where the Pastor was enmeshed in a series of personal problems and could not, in my opinion, truly serve the community as they deserved. So, what did I do? I quit. I stopped going. That was my biggest mistake. I didn't stop believing in God, but I stopped seeing my Church as an instrument of faith that brought me closer to God— a necessary and indispensable part of my life as a Christian.

So, when we moved here, I wanted to give it another try. I felt the need not only to be part of a Congregation, but to be active in Church life. From the moment I walked into St. Philip's, indescribable feelings and emotions stirred in me. I knew I was exactly where I belonged.

The lesson that I learned was this — God had not given up on me. He knew what I needed, and He led me to St. Philip's — a church of faith, of worship, of fellowship, of caring and participating, and serving our Lord Jesus Christ. Through our mission statement, our services, and many opportunities to serve, our Church provides us with a chance to set aside personal problems or biases or issues and seek our Lord, Jesus Christ, just as we are supposed to. St. Philip's is a place

of deep faith and community and friendship - a place so comfortable, I call it home.

Why do you attend service? Think about it and remember all the reasons — there are so many!

ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP AT SPLC

Our Church Council has decided to proceed with a program to improve environmental stewardship at St. Philip's Lutheran Church.

This endeavor will be organized through, the newly formed, "Environmental Stewardship Team," with David Porter [that's me], leading the team and reporting to Church Council.

This environmental stewardship program will include efforts to assess, prioritize issues, solve problems, educate, and improve and/or sustain solutions related to:

The energy efficiency and environmental impact of our church building and its operations, The environmental impact of our grounds and the activities that happen in this space, and The impact of the environment on all people. By caring for our environment, we care for our neighbors too.

These will be ongoing activity that can help build our community as we share in the care of this place.

I thank the Church Council for listening and being willing to place environmental stewardship as a priority for us at St. Philip's.

My passion for environmental awareness and care started in a dominant way during my employment as Art Director of SolarAge Magazine in the early 1980s. I believed, at that time, that I had landed a perfect job. I was an artist with a purpose, designing for good, and helping to move our nation, or at least our readers, away from our reliance on fossil fuel and the destruction of our atmosphere. It is interesting to see such initiatives find their way back into public awareness. SolarAge Magazine existed during a time of great controversy over energy resources and during an administration led by a President who did not see things as we did at SolarAge. The tax credits to solar industries were cut, SolarAge lost its advertising base, and had to reposition itself as a more generalized engineering magazine, and I had to look for other work.

So, this initiative at St. Philip's is something that many people have worked on individually, locally, nationally, and worldwide for decades. It is encouraging to see things coming to some fruition again regarding solar and other renewable energy solutions, and it is most encouraging to be at this church where we are now embracing environmental stewardship and demonstrating our desire to be responsible for our part of creation.

Thank you to all who have come forward, already, to assist me in this endeavor. It is obvious that there has been high interest in making sure we are caring for our place in as responsible a manner as possible.

Susan Mack has informed me of our long-standing environmental concerns expressed in the Outreach and Christian Education Committees. She recalls the organization of the Earth Day event a few years ago by Mary Duncan. Susan has provided information for possible grants and programs from "Energize Delaware" and the "Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative." The Interfaith Power and Light organization supports area congregations in improving their energy efficiency and to help them progress toward the use of clean energy. Through these and other connections we hope to begin our energy assessment soon.

Mary Duncan and Donna Porter, in consultation with Lisa Kalinowski and Dave Frampton, are streamlining and modernizing an "Environmental Guide for Congregations" checklist that will help us organize our concerns and set priorities. Interestingly to those of us new to SPLC, many environmental concerns were addressed in the design of this new church building. For instance, we all see our energy efficient lighting systems at work to save energy, LED lightbulbs have been installed to lessen our monthly bills as well as save energy, and our building is well insulated. These and other "sure saver" choices give us a great starting point with our energy and environmental assessments.

Phil Duncan and Mark Meyers worked with recommendations from Sacred Grounds representative Kerry Wilson to determine what we can do to improve our forested area. Be sure to come out to our Clean Up Day, now scheduled for Saturday, June 3rd where the identification and initial removal of invasive plants might take place, as part of that work day. We have learned that until all invasive plants are removed, it will be difficult for us to grow a healthy forest of canopy trees, mid-level trees, shrubs, flowers, and even a pollinator garden for the bees. Note that the forested area where the bee hives are is a good example of what our final healthy forested land should look like. So along with our volunteer efforts, plans are to bring in professional help to eradicate all invasive plant species in the hope that we can then sustain our natural plant species by finding and spot removing invasive species as they try to sneak their way back into our land. I thank Phil and Mary Duncan for sharing their experience with the Mount Cuba Gardening Center and Sacred Spaces. Phil has also begun the task of seeking grant funding for removal of invasive plants from our property and that looks promising.

Regarding the building, we will soon be assessing our operations, activities, energy efficiency, conservation and recycling efforts, and more. We will make sure we are handling the first-level and easiest tasks to be as energy efficient as possible. Hopefully, we can have an Energy Star /Lutherans Restoring Creation representative come to SPLC for an initial walkthrough assessment.

So, that is where we are as of this writing regarding the Environmental Care Team and its programming.

I invite anyone who is interested in the environmental stewardship of our place to contact me to join us.

Water in the Bible - Sept/Oct 2023

Water is an important biblical symbol - so important that we use it in baptism today. It is used in scripture from the very start of creation to the very end with the New Heaven and New Earth. Water was important to the people of Jesus time and location for life. How does this symbolic necessity speak deep meaning to the people of the bible, but also to us today?



JESUS EATS WITH EVERYONE

Biblical Meals/Hospitality - Nov/Dec 2023

People are always gathering for meals in scripture, but it is normally not just to eat. Typically in the hospitality shown in the bible, there is a larger message of blessing and welcome both for the host and guest. Did you know that hospitality is one of the most important themes in the entire bible? How can we learn from scripture how we are to welcome one another in grace?

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The Holy Spirit - Mar/Apr 2024

Let's be honest: we don't understand the Holy Spirit at all. We talk about this third person of the Trinity all the time, but what is the Holy Spirit and how does it work? Why do we care? Can't we just stick with Jesus? And why is the understanding of the Holy Spirit different in different books of the bible? Explore why the Holy Spirit is so important to us as God's Church.



Resurrection - Apr/May 2024

Okay, let's get to the heart of our faith . . . What happens to us when we die? What will we look like? Will we recognize our loved ones? Do we get partially raised while we wait for the end of the world? It is bodily resurrection or just spiritual? New life and resurrection are the heart of our faith - come explore this complex idea that is at the heart of Christianity.

And so it continues----racism, antisemitism, anti-LGBQT+, anti-Asian, anti---, anti---, anti! Gun violence is up. Antisemitism is up. One act of violence after another against political figures.

Depression, loneliness, nervousness, and anxiety---up in this country. Ask yourself why the Scandinavian countries are the happiest in the world? What is wrong with us? Even the black vote is still being suppressed---unthinkable in 2023!!

Several of us at St. Philip's just had a discussion on the book, "The Cross and the Lynching Tree". Powerful! Most of us are familiar with the lynchings in the South, torture, and the horrific atrocities that went on. But books like this one describe in detail how inhumane the treatment of innocent African American men, women, and children was. It is inconceiveable how human beings could treat other human beings like they did. Is it hatred? Is it fear? Whatever it is, we as Christians have a duty to help put an end to this insanity!

The faith of these persecuted black people was what sustained them—amazing!. And the comfort they received from their music-- blues, jazz, spirituals. Hope in the darkest of times—they never lost it. These are people who are mindful of the pain and tears of the past, yet stand on the strength and faith born in adversity. We can see people who have been mistreated and oppressed, but find reason to rejoice and petition our God for justice. These children of God hold tightly to the hope that sustains them as they look to a brighter day for future generations.

Sometimes I feel overwhelmed and discouraged by the seemingly endless news of homelessness, hunger, poverty, environmental degradation, violence, and ... well the list goes on, doesn't it? Why haven't we been able to "solve" these problems despite the determined efforts of so many people over the years? Does anything we do really make a difference?

After listening to the stories of staff and clients of Lutheran Community Service at the recent Room at the Table fundraising breakfast, my answer to the last question is YES!! I was so impressed by the work LCS is doing in our community and their creativity in taking new approaches to old problems. I found the new Food Farmacy program particularly intriguing. LCS is collaborating with Christiana Care to provide healthy food and individualized support to at-risk persons with chronic health conditions. Two of the speakers at the breakfast were a young woman who suffers from diabetes and a mentor from Christiana Care who is providing six months of one-to-one coaching on things such as selecting healthy foods and preparing healthy meals. The LCS client has already made big improvements in her medical condition with the healthy food from LCS and the medical expertise of her Christiana Care coach. I left the breakfast with renewed hope that, through an organization like LCS, we can truly make a difference in individual lives and our community as a whole. It is also clear how much LCS relies on the financial support and volunteer efforts of churches in the community such as St. Philip's. Learn more and change lives by visiting lcsde.org!














Learning Opportunities

It's annual inspection time again at the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center. This year, Center Executive Director, Michelle Williams says the news is good! The inspector for the Delaware Stars program recommended the Center for renewal of our license! Congratulations to the Hilltop Center and its staff.



Another state program called the Early Childhood Innovation Center (ECIC) invests in Delaware's childcare workforce like those individuals working at the Hilltop Center. Michelle says the ECIC "offers career advisement, full comprehensive associate & bachelor's degree scholarships, an innovative cohort model to obtain the Child Development Associate (CDA) credential,

and more!" In addition, Michelle says incentives are offered to potential students. "...incentives include a free laptop, \$1,000, \$5,000, or even \$10,000 in milestone stipends and scholarship opportunities that will be available beginning in June 2023! Several staff and myself, have attended an initial information session and they are looking forward to learning more about how to participate in this program."

Among our students, the older kids, grade 3 and up, are concentrating on basic math and writing skills. Hilltop Youth Services Coordinator, Teresa Allen says the program encourages children to dream. "I prompted our friends to think of a place that they always dreamed of going to and write a short passage about why they picked the place they did and present it to the group." Meanwhile, Renaissance Learning, a national assessment and learning platform, will be doing student evaluations. "Our young scholars with be assessed on their literacy and math skills. The learning platform," according to Teresa, "will use collected assessment data to create individualized lessons for each child. It also supplies a host of data reports in real time so that we may keep on top of the participants' struggles and successes."



Finally, Hilltop staff took a field trip to William Lewis Elementary School to participate in the school's virtual reader program. Center Deputy Director, Brandon Furrowh says staff chose the book to read, The 1619 Project Born on the Water by Nikole Hannah-Jones and Renee Watson. "This book illustrates the lives of enslaved people before being brought from Africa to America, and how a new culture was birthed through the hardships and oppression.
