Welcome Pastor Amy Wright!!!!

On November 6th, Pastor Amy Wright will officially begin her call as the Associate Pastor of St. Philip's Lutheran Church. I wanted to share some of my vision of how we need to be receiving Pastor Amy as she makes the transition to St. Philip's - that way we are all on the same page as she begins to do ministry with us here.

The first thing is that while Amy has the title of Associate Pastor, I am not thinking of her as less than me and none of us should think that way. Amy is also not "the Youth Pastor" of St. Philip's. Because in that way, she will be blessed by the ministry she does with us and she will be a blessing to us. It will be about me and Pastor Amy working as a team to do the best we can for St. Philip's and for the Church of Jesus Christ.



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There is an exciting ministry returning to St. Philip's in September! "DINNERS OF EIGHT"

There is within all three Abramic Faiths (Judaism, Christianity, Islam) a deep appreciation for and practice of hospitality. In the modern era, there are few opportunities to experience its main expression, that is, meal fellowship. "Dinners of Eight" seeks to offer members of a congregation, their friends, and, possibly in time, people of other faiths, opportunities to experience each other. It is small (actually, intimately so), relatively easy to pull off (eight is a manageable number to fit around any formal table so as NOT to exclude people with smaller homes), and once established, tends to sustain and grow itself.

Signup sheets are posted in the Narthex allowing all congregation members the opportunity to join a "dinner of eight". Those that choose to host should provide the main course and ask the others coming to dinner to bring an appetizer, vegetable, salad, or dessert. The offering of wine and/or beer should be decided by the whole group.

After meeting and sharing dinner, it is encouraged that the guests then host a dinner of their own, which is again open to the members of the congregation to join. Following these gatherings, the ministry would expand again in the same way with the guests hosting their own "dinner of eight". Our plan is to restart this program here at St. Philip's in September. I look forward to witnessing our congregation come together and grow into a community bound together in fellowship.

Under his leadership, EJI has won major legal challenges eliminating excessive and unfair sentencing, exonerating innocent death row prisoners, confronting abuse of the incarcerated and the mentally ill, and aiding children prosecuted as adults. Bryan Stevenson's bestselling book, *Just Mercy*, is a powerful true story about the Equal Justice Initiative, the people they represent, and the importance of confronting injustice. An unforgettable story about the potential for mercy to redeem us, Just Mercy has been adapted into a feature film.

St. Phillips Host Week: November 5-11

Prior to COVID, the families (usually 3 or 4 families) were housed in different churches throughout New Castle County. During their stays, the hosting churches provided breakfast, lunch & an evening meal.

During the 3 years of the pandemic, the host's duty was to provide the evening meal. Beginning in 2023, Family Promise families now live at the Jesus House off of Milltown Road. That change has resulted in how and what the host churches provide and the 3 or 4 families now are 5+.

The families live in a cottage that has a kitchen and a laundry shared by all and separate quarts for each family. In order to make the families comfortable, host churches now provide food for breakfast and lunch, staples such as laundry detergent, etc., and prepare an evening meal.

As the needs have changed, so is our way of asking for help. There are sign-up posters in the Narthex with menus and perishables items which will collected prior to November 5 and a Sign Up Genius for the staples. Please click this link to access the Sign Up Genius:

FAMILY PROMISE

Our Next Host Week: November 5, 2023 to November 11, 2023

November 5th, is All Saints' Sunday. It's the time in the church year when we remember all of the faithful who have gone before us in faith, especially those who have died during this year. It's time to reflect and to thank God for these saints. It's our opportunity to thank God for his faithful promise and assurance that we will join our departed loved ones and live with God forever.

Here at St. Philip's, we also remember the children who have been born during this church year, as they are just beginning their faith journey. We celebrate their lives, as they walk with their families and all of us, learning about Jesus, our Savior, and the love that God has for them.

We actually celebrate *all saints* every day, but who are all saints? They are everyone of us throughout the ages. We are saints and sinners at the same time. We are sinners because that's our human nature. On the flip side, we are saints through the death and resurrection of the only human who ever made it through the temptations of an earthly life without sin! We know that by Jesus' innocent death and victorious resurrection, *all* of us are forgiven for *all* of our sins.

Because he was human, Jesus completely understands our failures, feelings, and emotions. When he saw his beloved friend, Mary, weeping at her brother Lazarus' grave, the Bible tells us, "Jesus was deeply moved in spirit and troubled," (John 11:33) and that "Jesus wept." (John 11:35) Nearing the end of his earthly life, Jesus was so concerned about the Israelite people that "as he approached Jerusalem and saw the city, he wept over it." (Luke 19:41) Because Jesus understood our need for his constant comfort and support, he promised "surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:20b)

God also provides care and support through his children who walk with us on this earth. Those who mourn the loss of a loved one, failing health, or other painful times, can know the present comfort provided by a loving God and a compassionate Christian community. This comfort can be experienced to-day – not just in the next life. Yet those who mourn still grieve, despite the comfort extended to them from others. It's okay to grieve the loss of our loved ones and to cry despite the care extended by others. We still feel God's comfort even through our tears. Remembering Jesus' words helps: "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted." (Matthew 5:4) As Christians we do not pretend that death has no sting; instead we clearly speak of the pain of our loss. Our confidence in the joy of the resurrection and the assurance that our loved ones are already enjoying the total peace, love and joy that only comes in the presence of our Lord, comforts us that our loved ones are resting in eternal life with God.

As you remember your departed loved ones this All Saints Sunday, it's okay if tears stain your cheeks. Hopefully we will also remember to sing "Alleluia!" in our hearts—being surrounded by God's love and the love of a caring congregation! Thanks be to God!

Years ago, I was attending an Interim Ministry Network Annual Conference in Pittsburgh. Mrs. Mueller, "Gigi" to most of you, was able to get off work at St. Francis Hospital and tagged along. I dropped her off near the campus of the University of Pittsburgh each morning. The Carnegie Museums of Natural History and Art are right there. She loved visiting those institutions. When I asked her if she wanted to go anywhere for her birthday in May, she said "Pittsburgh." Since I am from there, I didn't mind even slightly.

We were waiting for a bus in downtown. Across the street and down a hundred feet or so, a crowd had gathered on the sidewalk with some people sitting on the stone steps of an inner city church.

Both of us were captured by the scene. For the ten minutes before the bus came, we watched with intrigue. The gathered crowd of roughly several dozen included whites and blacks. Unsurprisingly, we noticed no Asians. There were a few who were quite young, a majority, I would guess, of 35 to 50 year olds, just a couple of old codgers. Oh, there were women and men.

They chatted, laughed, gestured "high fives," and generally were having a good old time, right there in front of the church. Could it be said they were loving each other unconditionally? Clearly, they were getting along just fine. This was hardly the business crowd outside for lunch on a nice spring day. There was no singing, no liturgy, no reading of any word, nor the preaching on it. Without trying to guess who or what was believed, could this have been church?

Three decades or so ago, I was attending a National Jewish-Christian Workshop in Minneapolis. There were no personal cell phones back then. On Sunday I asked at the desk for "Yellow Pages." Huh? I looked up Lutheran Churches, found one on the same street as the hotel, and started what I thought would be an easy walk. Ha! Thanks heavens I allowed plenty of time. After 15 blocks, I wondered if ever I would get there. I decided to stop at a diner for coffee.

Five of six older black men and two women were gathered. Then in came "Rodney," a white blind fellow, probably about 30. To make what became a long but beautiful story short, the manner in which they were treating each other and especially Rodney utterly fascinated me, so much so that I got up early on Monday to go back to see if hey were there? They were. There was no singing, liturgy, reading or preaching, but could this be church? I certainly wasn't sure but wondered? Oh, by the way, on Sunday, the Lutheran Church was another 12 blocks. There was singing, liturgy, reading and preaching. It was church! How do I know? Good and kind Christians gave me a ride back to my hotel!
