Holy Land Trip Postponed!!!!

As most of you are aware, we had a group of about 23 people from St. Philip's scheduled to travel to the Holy Land in January. We were all looking forward to "Walking in the Footsteps of Jesus" as we made our way through many of the places that Jesus would have walked when he was on Earth. I know I was truly excited for this trip—it was something that I have wanted to do for more years than I can count.

However, the violence that currently exists in that region has caused us to postpone the trip. Although the primary violence is in the southern part of Israel in the area of Gaza there is simply too much risk in going to the region at this point. Even the United States State Department has travel bans in effect at this point.

So, our group will wait until there is an other opportunity to visit that region.

In the meantime, be sure to keep the people of Israel as well as the Palestinians in your prayers. While Hamas began this fight, it's important to remember that most people whether Jewish or Palestinian just want to live their lives in peace. And that is the Peace that God craves for all of us. We'll keep you posted on when a new trip is scheduled.

It is with excitement that I write this article because I see an incredibly loving, passionate, driven, devoted, and giving congregation at St. Philip's. It is an honor to serve with and alongside you. Pr. Patrick's and my doors are always open to you. We are in this together.

Advent - Waiting

Why aren't we singing Christmas songs all day on Christmas Eve? Why do we have to wait until the evening services before we sing Christmas songs? After all, there is a worship service on the morning of Christmas Eve.

There actually is a good reason why we don't sing Christmas songs that morning. Christmas Eve is on a Sunday this year. That Sunday is the fourth Sunday in Advent. We don't want to cut short the season of Advent because it is just as important as any other season in the church year.

Advent is a time of waiting, preparation and anticipation. It's a time when we remember how long the Israelites waited for the coming of the Messiah. We also anticipate when Christ will come again in glory.

Waiting is never easy to do but it is an important part of life. Most of us are impatient, wanting to rush to the finish line. The commercialism that has taken hold of Christmas doesn't help, but let's try to enjoy this Advent season.

Waiting can be a nice time if we use it as a time to focus. Think about Thanksgiving Day. Hours are spent preparing the food, as the house fills with wonderful smells. As we spend hours smelling turkey, pumpkin pie and other things roasting in the oven, the anticipation becomes almost overwhelming (as evidenced by the growling stomachs). The meal, when we finally get to it, is nice but the waiting can be just as good, if not better.

Another time of waiting, preparation and anticipation is when a woman is pregnant. The months of waiting allow plenty of time for preparing a room and buying clothes and other necessary supplies. The anticipation grows as names are chosen. It is a great time of knowing the child is here, but not quite.

Enjoy the Advent season and its songs of waiting and anticipation.

Happy Holidays!!

With Thanksgiving just past, preparations underway for Christmas, and the new year on the horizon, the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center continues to multitask by taking a deep dive into improving the educational opportunities for our students.



According to the Center's Youth Services Coordinator, Teresa Allen, two new reading programs were chosen this fall. "We decided to have Kindergarten through First Grade do our Book Nook Program and Third Grade through Sixth Grade do the Renaissance Learning Program." Teresa says the effort began with an assessment of student reading skills. "The test for the Renaissance program required each child to read a story and then take a test on what they read. The test for Book Nook required reading and then guiding sessions on reading."

Teresa points out that this learning effort is not limited to reading. "There is also a Math Component of Renaissance Learning called Freckle. All the children will be using Freckle as their Math Program."

In addition to the afore-mentioned reading and math evaluations, Teresa says the Center is also working with the schools. "We...made contact by email with all the principals of the schools our children attend to arrange site visits to each school. The visits (began) in November and continue until we have visited every school."



The story doesn't end there. According to Teresa, a new school aged communications tool called "Class Dojo" has also been adopted at Hilltop. "Class Dojo allows for direct staff to parent and group communication with families. There are games young people can play on the Dojo Island online platform. The app also allows staff to communicate with each other... individually and as a team. Class Dojo even allows our staff to provide behavior data that can be seen by parents."


