

#### What's Next for St. Philip's in 2024? Parking Lot Expansion & Basement Finishing

So, with this edition of the *Guidepost* we are ringing in a New Year. We are also entering into a year when we are going to have to once again begin talking about where St. Philip's is going in the coming years. The answer to that question is longer than this *Guidepost* article can describe. After all, we generally only get a few paragraphs per month. So, the answer to where we are going as a congregation is something we'll be laying out for you in the coming weeks and months. But this one thing I can tell you . . . We can't get there until we deal with two problems. And both of them have to do with space.

When we moved the church in 2016 there were two things that we "scrimped" on . . . The parking lot and the basement finishing. You see, at that time, we were already dealing with cost overruns - but even more than that, when you are asking a congregation to take on a project like building a new church building, there is a huge burden of being a good and faithful steward of your money. So, when the building team in 2015 and 2016 was looking at what we were spending all in the hope that we would grow when we got here, we were . . . well, scared. So, we scaled down the project so that the parking lot was the bare minimum it could be under State of Delaware regulations. And we scaled down and didn't finish the basement, including installing an elevator (which would be required by the county when we put in for a building permit).

And during COVID, we didn't want to take on those projects because we didn't know what St. Philip's would look like when we came out of the pandemic . . . Well, let me tell you . . . We are stronger and more active than ever. We regularly fill the parking lot on Sundays. For both Christmas concerts this year we had to have people park in fire lanes. And as I write this letter to you Christmas Eve is coming in a few days . . . Christmas Eve 2019 saw people drive around our parking lot and when it was full, they left and went somewhere else. This can't happen again. Likewise, our space on a Sunday morning is maxed out. We need more rooms for folks to meet and we need to free up our Fellowship Hall for it's intended use.

So, at our Congregational Meeting on January 28th, we are going to introduce our initiative to finish the building so that we can be ready for our future that we have planned out and so that we can welcome people in. We know a Jesus that the world needs to meet—and we need to make space for them so that they can meet this Jesus. Because one thing we know about everyone who has come to join St. Philip's . . . They are blessed by us and we are blessed by them. And together the world is blessed by what we do as St. Philip's together. Join us on January 28th.

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It is a joy to be here at St. Philip's!

One of my favorite ministries, that I am greatly looking forward to leading, is **Pub Theology** that begins January 18th from 6:30-8:30pm at Chuck Lager. We will gather every third Thursday. Some of the best conversations I have ever had about God and my faith have been over a beer. We all have questions, thoughts and ideas. We all have a theology - what words we use to talk about God and our faith, and Pub Theology is a great way to do that.

Pub Theology is all about open and honest, relaxed, and faith-filled conversations about things that matter. A table where all perspectives are welcome and appreciated. The format is simple: *beer, conversation, and God.* Come and bring your questions and thoughts, bring a friend, pull up a chair, and join me. You'll be able to share your own wrestlings and thoughts while learning something new along the way, and hey— there's likely to be a good craft beer you haven't tried yet!

My article is rooted in Matthew Chapter 5, verses 13-16 just after the Beatitudes where Jesus is still speaking to the people, including his disciples.

"You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven."

Jesus is emphasizing that it is not enough to just believe in him, but it is also important for us to share his message and display actions with all people (including family, friends, neighbors, and strangers) consistent with what he has shared with us - that Jesus is the light, the way, the connection to God and to eternal life.

Have you ever had an encounter with a stranger who asked for help and when you paid attention to that person you felt the presence of Jesus? Maybe it was the person's spoken words to you, maybe their demeanor, or perhaps the way your eyes connected to their eyes. Somehow, some way you knew that person to be one who had faith in God.

I recall one such encounter that happened to me many years. I was exiting a fancy restaurant in Philadelphia with some colleagues and business associates all dressed in suits and ties when a homeless person asked for some spare change so he could get something to eat. I, like the others in my group, initially ignored him. I then awkwardly reached into my pocket to give him some money and when I gave the cash to him, he gently grabbed my hand and said God Bless You. Its s not his words that moved me, but the touch and the connection we made with our eyes that made me feel that Jesus was in our midst. I thought I was the one doing the good deed, when in fact it was the homeless person sharing the light of the world with me.

One of my colleagues said I was making a mistake to give money to this homeless person and that he would only use it on drugs and alcohol. I told him that I believed and felt he would use it to feed himself and even if he didn't do that, I gave him a meaningless amount of money to me that was probably all that he had received that day, and it was his choice to use it wisely.

As Christians, we try to follow the advice of Jesus to let our light shine on others, whether that individual is a Christian, a Jew, a Muslim, or a person without faith. We shine our light by demonstrating patience, kindness, joy, and generosity as Jesus continues to show us every day!

Let us pray: Heavenly Father continue to bless all your people with your love, grace, peace, and comfort. Guide us to show your light of the world, our savior and lord, Jesus, to the world. Amen.





Food Insecurity due to inflation is on the Rise! Can you help? Food demand still continues to be very high. 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#### ARE YOU TIRED...

of hearing about racial and ethnic strife on a nearly daily basis? Individuals, both young and old, simply going about their lives, being attacked verbally and physically because of their skin color, their religion, the clothes they wear... Isn't it enough? Won't it just go away? How long must we endure such senseless, corrosive antipathy?

These are the sentiments expressed by Senator Chuck Schumer in a speech to the US Senate regarding the large spike in hate crimes against Jewish Americans after the October 7 attack by Hamas. This spike comes *on top of* a rising rate of anti-Semitic incidents over the past several years. People attacked at their synagogues, swastikas painted on walls, Jewish cemeteries vandalized, Jewish businesses mobbed. Schumer notes that it is no wonder Jewish Americans live in some fear.

Of course, Jewish people are not alone. The Council on Islamic-American Relations reports an increase of nearly 200% in anti-Muslim incidents in America after October 7<sup>th</sup>. Women in hijabs attacked, Muslim families threated at gunpoint, a 7-year-old Muslim boy stabbed to death. It is no wonder that Muslim Americans live in some fear.

Why such hatred and violence against these, and other, groups? The causes of animosity toward others are more complex than can be adequately addressed in this brief article. There is a starting point, however, that scholars identify: Xenophobia. The fear of strangers or "others." To the extent that individuals see those unlike themselves as not merely different, but dangerous, hatred and violence easily develop, and those with the power and resources to cause violence do so.

So, are you tired? Me too. But how can we diminish the hatred and violence? Again, not a question given to easy answers. Still, we can make a start, taking a lesson from Jesus. Born into a culture and a religious tradition that esteemed being "set apart" and that scorned "others," Jesus came to reject this viewpoint. He cared about his own people, of course, but he also valued the "others" of his day – Romans, tax collectors, Samaritans, and other assorted "sinners." His message was not to fear, hate, and lash out at these others, but to welcome and love them. We can act similarly today. We can reject messages which assert that those who are not like "us" are dangerous and to be feared. We can support those persons and causes which value, welcome, and seek to serve ALL. To paraphrase St Paul - being Jew or Gentile (or Muslim or black or brown) does not matter – there is no distinction. God loves all, and so should we.

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The newly formed Environmental Stewardship Team has been at work during these past few months. In addition to projects addressing recycling needs and energy and water use assessments, we have received a long-term commitment from the church council to restore our woodlands, meadows, and wetlands to a more natural and healthy state. That will involve the work-for-hire of Red Tail Restoration and Land Management. The Red Tail staff will prioritize areas of need on our property, identify invasive plants, and remove them in order of priority.

We are invited to work along side Red Tail staff, as we are able, as volunteers. This will help defray the cost of this work, as well as provide proof, particularly for grants that are being applied for, that we are dedicated to this project as a congregation willing to fund as well as to work as volunteers to see it through.

The Environmental Stewardship Team invites you to our January 7<sup>th</sup>, 2024, Together In Faith breakfast, at which, Phil Duncan and I will report on the status of the Woodlands, Meadows, and Wetlands restoration project.

I will introduce you to some of our other projects as well. For instance, we are addressing needs as we find them to clarify recycling procedures, limiting use of plastic tableware, and more. We are planning for future energy and water use audits to optimize the energy efficiency of our building and other concerns like conservation of water.

We honor and respect the efforts of this congregation that, not too long ago, sold their old property and purchased this new property in a huge act of faith to provide their services to an expanded community. The attention to building details, during construction, such as adequate insulation, reflective and heat resistant windows, LED motion sensor lighting, and more is testament to the importance this congregation already has for caring for our environment.

Perhaps there is a New Year's resolution we an all make, that is to be more caring and kind to all of God's creation. That care can be shown in small tasks that bring about big change when many participate. So please know that all are invited to be a part of our Environmental Stewardship Team whether it be to join us in specific volunteer tasks to restore our woodlands, meadows, and wetlands, or to join us as team members wrestle with the environmental issues of our times and to solve them in our community at least.


