

Water is Life—So How Can We Help?

As you are reading this, we are just about to have or will recently have held our Annual Congregational Meeting. At that time you will hear about some of the exciting things that we are hoping to do with our facility: an expanded parking lot and finishing the basement. But you are also going to hear (or you will have heard) about a group called Water is Life, Kenya.

Water is Life, Kenya is a local organization right here in Wilmington whose mission is to help the people in Kenya have clean water supply for their children and their villages. Clean water as it turns out is vital not just for health of their bodies, but for the health of the entire community. When clean water comes, so much changes for those whose lives were spent trying to find a source of drinkable water. Water is Life, Kenya helps find locations in villages where clean water wells can be drilled, helps drill those wells, and also puts in the infrastructure to help store water and keep the well running well into the future. But it goes so much further than that. Because once a village has water, the women who spent time walking miles and miles, hours upon hours, to find water can use their time to start businesses and make money for their families. Children, can now be properly bathed and therefore can go to school. Now, we are talking about transforming not just what is consumed, but we are talking about helping support families and communities. People begin to thrive this way. Water is Life Kenya helps with all these aspects of helping people thrive in their villages in Kenya.

Back in the Fall, we welcomed the founder of WILK to our OWLS group—Joyce Tannian is the director of this group and invited us to pray about how St. Philip's might be able to help people in Kenya have clean water and better their lives. And we are going to respond. During 2024 and 2025, we are going to partner with WILK to help them provide a village with new life. I am reminded of Jesus going into one of the villages in Samaria (a foreign country) and offering a woman at a well "living water" (John 4). Well, this is the gift we hope to give to a community in Kenya this year.

We hope you will help become a part of this wonderful project to bless the people of the world with the grace that we have been offered in Jesus Christ . . . To be satisfied in both body and spirit. And maybe you might even join us in Kenya in dedicating this well when it is finished. Ask me more about this exciting project.

Greetings St. Philip's!



This is such a great church! You are loved. You are enough.



The Baptism of Jesus

In New Testament scripture Matthew 3: 13-17. John the Baptist Prepares the Way. In those days John the Baptist came, preaching in the wilderness of Judea and saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is he who was spoken of through the prophet Isaiah:

"A voice of one calling in the wilderness, Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him."

John's clothes were made of camel's hair, and he had a leather belt around his waist. His food was locusts and wild honey. People went out to him from Jerusalem and all Judea and the whole region of the Jordan. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River.

But when he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to where he was baptizing, he said to them: "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce fruit in keeping with repentance. And do not think you can say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' I tell you that out of these stones God can raise up children for Abraham. The ax is already at the root of the trees, and every tree that does not produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire.

"I baptize you with water for repentance. But after me comes one who is more powerful than I, whose sandals I am not worthy to carry. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor, gathering his wheat into the barn and burning up the chaff with unquenchable fire."




Ministries at St. Philip's from Koinonia

February 14th, Valentine's Day, is such a great time to think about love. We share our deep feelings with our loved ones, giving gifts to show how much someone means to us. Hugs and kisses are everywhere that day. We remember our loved ones who have passed away and remember their love, while we wish we could give them one more hug. Valentine's Day is such a nice day to think about how much we are loved by so many people.

This year, Valentine's Day has a special meaning of love because it shares February 14th with Ash Wednesday. On Ash Wednesday, we begin the season of Lent, in which we remember Jesus' journey of love toward the cross, which culminates in the greatest sacrifice of love - Jesus' death and resurrection! There has never been a love as pure and strong as the love our Lord has for all of us.

It's a shame that in English we only have one word for love. In Greek, there are several words for love, each one meaning a different type of love. Storge is the type of love that you find within a family, such as the love that a parent has for his or her child. Eros is romantic, sexual love. Phileo is reciprocal love between friends. Then there is agape love, which is the highest form of love. Agape love is unconditional, sacrificial and totally centered on the recipient. Agape love is best described in 1 Corinthians 13:4-7.

⁴Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. ⁵ It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. ⁶ Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. ⁷ It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

God offers this agape love to everyone. To be loved with such powerful, unconditional love, which we don't deserve, is overwhelming. There are no words to describe how thankful this agape love makes us feel. We want to return this agape love to God. We love God because he first loved us. God wants us to share this agape love with everyone around us, also. When Jesus was asked what the greatest commandment was, his response was all about love. In Matthew 22:37-39, we read:

³⁷ Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. ³⁸ This is the first and greatest commandment. ³⁹ And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.

This Valentine's Day and throughout Lent, let's try to think of new and different ways to share God's agape love with the world. Many people **give up** something for Lent, which is fine; but, why don't we try to **give** agape love each day. And, let's not stop after Lent. God never stops giving us his agape love and he doesn't want us to stop either.

We are always looking for new members – and if you have given a thought to "What would I like to do as part of my ministry for St. Philips" Altar Guild and the Bread Ministry team are here to welcome you – We meet approximately 4 times a year – Everyone is assigned on our quarterly schedules – approximately 2 or 3 times a quarter – and it entails – approximately 1 ½ – 2 hrs the weekend you are assigned. Bread Ministry entails making the bread and bringing it to church for Sunday Services – you are assigned usually 5 times in the year. Don't worry – if this isn't your area to get involved we understand – there are so many areas to share your particular expertise / excitement. St. Philips Host Week: April 7-13

Thank you to everyone who helped to make our January host week a success! Family Promise, as well as the families they serve, are so appreciative of the food, supplies, and time given to them. Our next host week will be April 7-13 and then again on May 12-18.

Before COVID, the families (usually 3 or 4 families) were housed in different churches throughout New Castle County. During their stays, the hosting churches provided breakfast, lunch, and evening meals. During the three years of the pandemic, the host's duty was to provide the evening meal. Beginning in 2023, Family Promise families now live at the Jesus House off of Milltown Road. That change has resulted in how and what the host churches provide food. The families live in a cottage that has a kitchen and a laundry shared by all, and separate quarters for each family. To make the families comfortable, host churches now provide food for breakfast and lunch, staples such as laundry detergent, etc., and an evening meal. As the needs have changed, so is our way of asking for help.

There will be sign-up posters in the Narthex with menus in mid-March. Also at that time, we will email out a Sign-Up Genius link for perishables items which will collected before April 7.

BIBLICAL VIEWS ON DIVERSITY AND DISCRIMINATION

In the past few years, I have read a dozen books featuring the character or the decline of the Christian Church in America. If, by the grace of God, in the Name of Jesus, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, we will be able to reverse the decline and be in the best position to witness to our faith, we MUST know the Scriptures. As the traditional prayer invites: we are to "read, mark, learn and inwardly digest" the Word of God.

My readings suggest that there are assumptions about what the Bible says that are patently inaccurate. Misinterpretations have replaced truths and become common place.

A decade ago, studies showed that only 6% (SIX PERCENT) of Lutheran Christians were involved in any formal group Bible study. Despite notions to the contrary, other Christians are equally negligent.

There are only a few other issues that pervade our existence negatively than racial ones around the world, especially in America. It can be said that how this matter is handled or mishandled, influences how other pressing issues of diversity and tensions are experienced.

We cannot definitively settle this or any other matter. We can, however, do a "fly over" and land on some significant passages that can increase our knowledge, assist us in avoiding historic errors, and motivate us to dig deeper into our faith, which forgives and frees and does not belittle and bind.
