

#### The New Building Program is Coming . . .

As you are well aware by now, we are beginning the process of expanding the parking lot and finishing the basement here at St. Philip's. So, what you might be wondering as a member of this church is, "How does that work all get done?" "Who does it?" The short answer is that you do it . . . With the help of people who have amazing gifts and talents you will do that work. No, it doesn't mean that you will be hammering studs, painting parking spot lines, or anything like that. It means that in one way or another we all have a role.


It starts with the plan . . . The folks in our property team and council have been working for months and even years with an engineering firm and New Castle County to develop a plan that would allow us to expand the parking lot along the north border of the property. An engineering plan is developed with considerations for the environment and water runoff, etc. For the basement, an architect produces plans for the layout of the basement with specifications for plumbing, HVAC, fire suppression, insulation, dimensions, etc. All of that is signed off on by New Castle County so we can get building permits.


Then a building team, that is made up of folks who sit next to you in worship will work to get bids from contractors to do the work. Meanwhile, we are all going to be working together to raise the additional funds we need to pay for the project: that's the capital campaign. We'll all be giving additional monies on top of what we normally give (because we can't slow what we do to keep the ministry going at the same time) for a finite period of time to make the project happen.

Then the building starts inside and outside. The basement will look much like the upstairs looks, keeping the theme the same. The parking lot will look like . . . Well, a parking lot with the ability to turn around just like our lot does now. And we'll just about double our current parking (not exactly, but nearly).

If you have questions, we want you to know that you can always ask us. Find me and ask me and if I don't know the answer, I'll get you to the person who can answer your question. And also be in prayer . . . Praying about how you will be able to support this plan to finish off what we were not able to do when we built the building in 2016. And thank you for all you do for our ministry.

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As we continue in our Lenten season, it has been the "Footprints In The Sand Prayer" that has been on repeat in my mind. *Have you ever heard of it?* It is a well-known prayer + poem hybrid that I will think about, forget about, and then when I rediscover it, it blesses me as if reading it for the first time. And during this holy season of Lent, with the focus on repentance, this *turning* back to God, it is my hope that it blesses you and helps to give you eyes to see God at work in your life a little bit better.

One night I dreamed a dream. As I was walking along the beach with my Lord. Across the dark sky flashed scenes from my life. For each scene, I noticed two sets of footprints in the sand, One belonging to me and one to my Lord. After the last scene of my life flashed before me, I looked back at the footprints in the sand. I noticed that at many times along the path of my life, especially at the very lowest and saddest times, there was only 1 set of footprints......This really troubled me, so I asked the Lord about it. "Lord, you said once I decided to follow you, You'd walk with me all the way. But I noticed that during the saddest and most troublesome times of my life, there was only one set of footprints. I don't understand why, when I needed You the most, You would leave me and let this happen to me." He whispered, "My precious child, I love you and will never leave you. Never, ever, during the difficult times you faced. When you saw only one set of footprints, it was then that I carried you."

Receive this blessing: You are what God made you to be: created in Christ Jesus, chosen as holy and beloved, freed to serve your neighbor. God bless you that you may be a blessing, in the name of the holy and life-giving trinity. Amen.



There is within all three Abramic Faiths (Judaism, Christianity, Islam) a deep appreciation for and practice of hospitality. In the modern era, there are few opportunities available to experience its main expression, that is, meal fellowship. "Dinners of Eight" seeks to offer members of our congregation, their friends, and, possibly in time, people of other faiths, opportunities to experience each other. It is a smaller gathering (eight is a manageable number to fit around a dinner table allowing those with smaller homes to also participate as host), relatively easy to pull off, and, once established, tends to sustain and grow itself.

Signup sheets have been posted in the Narthex allowing all congregation members the opportunity to join a "dinner of eight". Those that choose to host should provide the main course and ask the others coming to dinner to bring an appetizer, vegetable, salad, or dessert. The offering of wine and/or beer should be decided by the whole group.

After meeting and sharing dinner, it is encouraged that the guests then host a dinner of their own, which is again open to the members of the congregation to join. Following these gatherings, the ministry would expand again in the same way with the guests hosting their own "dinner of eight". 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# PUB + HEOLOGY





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#### There is Good News!

The good news is that there is good news out there! The bad news is that the "good news" rarely makes the news. Recurring dramatic events and heated words command our attention, and imply that there is little hope for the world, the country, and even our own way of life.

It is not difficult to see why negative impressions develop. Recently, violence between Palestinians and Israelis is a frequent lead story in the media. Verbal and physical attacks against Jews and Muslims receive prominent exposure. Fiery comments about certain groups and their "dangers" draw immediate notice. We hear so much anger, disagreement – even hate – expressed. What to do?

A natural reaction to threat or injury is to take counter measures as quickly as possible. Sometimes the reaction is automatic, as in removing a hand from a hot burner. Sometimes the reaction is more intentional. A verbal insult results in a return insult, a threat generates a counter threat or physical attack. And, of course, a physical attack rarely results in turning the other cheek - and the cycle starts.

In many cases, counter attacks come at a very high cost. "The Troubles" in Northern Ireland between Catholics and Protestants led to many deaths. British rule in India after WW I imposed severe restrictions on civil liberties, leading to the emergence of nationalist groups that attacked the British, leading to British counter attacks and deaths on both sides. South Africa's Apartheid policy from 1948-1984 severely restricted the lives of black citizens, resulting in widespread violence, sabotage, and deaths.

Things have changed. Though some tensions remain, Northern Ireland Catholics and Protestants are not killing each other. India is free from British rule and the restrictions imposed by it. Economic and social challenges remain, but South Africa eliminated Apartheid as a national policy in favor of a true democracy. How did these changes come about?

Though many factors contributed to change, central to all these changes were efforts to bring opposing groups together through non-violent actions and difficult but clear negotiations about fundamental concerns. The "Troubles" were resolved through a long series of discussions/negotiations among rival factions, sponsored by private and government representatives. Ghandi led non-violent resistance against the British, compelling them to reconsider and eventually end colonial rule and its oppression. After years of imprisonment, Nelson Mandella used his fame to begin peaceful negotiations with the government of South Africa, resulting in the end of Apartheid and its institutions of mistreatment.

Since the 1948 partition of Palestine, Arabs and Jews have been at war off and on to the present day, both arguing the rightness of their cause, and both incurring heavy loss of life generation after generation. Even the suggestion of reconciliation led to the death of Jewish and Arab leaders by extremists among their own people – Anwar Sadat of Egypt, and Yitzhak Rabin of Israel. The present turmoil seems to offer no brighter future.

Yet, even in the midst of animosity, there are ongoing, grassroots efforts to achieve reconciliation and peace in the Middle East. Here are examples stated in their own words:

**Combatants for Peace** is a grassroots movement of Israelis and Palestinians, working together to end the occupation and bring peace, equality and freedom to our homeland. Committed to joint nonviolence since our inception, we use civil resistance, education and other creative means of activism to transform systems of oppression and build a free and peaceful future from the ground up. Launched in

2006, we are the only movement worldwide that was founded by former fighters on both sides of an active conflict. As a result, we were nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2017 and 2018. We believe in a future where all people live in peace with dignity, justice, and liberty.

The Parents Circle – Families Forum (PCFF) is a joint Israeli-Palestinian organization of over 600 families, all of whom have lost an immediate family member to the ongoing conflict. Moreover, the PCFF has concluded that the process of reconciliation between nations is a prerequisite to achieving a sustainable peace. The organization thus utilizes all resources available in education, public meetings and the media, to spread these ideas. Let us remember that violence begets violence, and the only way forward is through peaceful dialogue, diplomacy, and a commitment to finding common ground. It is a call to action for leaders, communities, and individuals alike to seek solutions that prioritize reconciliation, justice, and lasting peace.

Standing Together is a grassroots movement mobilizing Jewish and Palestinian citizens of Israel in pursuit of peace, equality, and social and climate justice. While the minority who benefit from the status quo of occupation and economic inequality seek to keep us divided, we know that we — the majority — have far more in common than that which sets us apart. When we stand together, we are strong enough to fundamentally alter the existing socio-political reality. The future that we want — peace and independence for Israelis and Palestinians, full equality for all citizens, and true social, economic, and environmental justice — is possible. Because where there is struggle, there is hope.

The good news is that these and similar groups are actively collaborating nonviolently to bring about reconciliation and peace. Like other efforts for justice, the timetable for change may be longer than desired, but we can take heart that, like earlier initiatives, their goals can be achieved. Our prayers for peace matter.

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Thank you to all who have come out to help Phil and Mary Duncan and the whole Environmental Stewardship Team with all the invasive plant removals. We will meet from 10am to noon on the first Saturday and third Wednesday of each month until we have mastered these plants that do not belong on our land. We are hitting them hard and so lowering our costs from service providers through this sweat equity, while the larger removals by Redtail Restoration and Land Management can be accomplished. Regarding indoor efforts, please watch for signs about reusing, repairing, and recycling as well as instructions to better handle our coffee station waste and more...

Remember that these activities are useful at home and other places you frequent besides the church. I am impressed by how many church members have come forward to express their interest in lessening our impact on our environment. Peace and love to all, Port

#### "The Wonderful World of Snow!"

Inclement weather twice closed the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center in January, but when the kids returned to their classrooms, they made the best of it.



Center Youth Services Coordinator, Teresa Allen, says students "explored the wonderful world of snow! Our Kindergarten and 1st grade friends navigated through snow concepts using literacy. Small groups independently read 'The First Snowflake' and shared ways they can possibly help their parents on a snowy day as Shane helped his mom in the book. Our friends were able to build fluency and confidence by repeating the skills and vocabulary from the story."

Teresa details that students also dove into STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) topics. "Youth played with math focused file folder games on fractions, measurement, money, and algebraic thinking. Students also completed targeted math assignments on our online learning platform as well as building with wooden pattern blocks." Sure beats "see Spot run!"

Meanwhile, Center Deputy Director, Brandon Furrowh says Hilltop received a major grant this winter. "The United Way of Delaware awarded Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center \$10,000.00 to implement the Study Break Live program." Brandon says this is "an original program designed to provide a fun mental health break to high school students while integrating the exploration of post-

secondary educational options as well as employment options." But the program doesn't stop there. Brandon <u>says</u> "this year, Hilltop will establish a collaboration with Jobs for Delaware Graduates for their job fair on March 26, 2024 at Delaware Technical Community College."

Finally, in addition to math and literacy, another major part of the mission of the Hilltop Center is feeding those students who are under nourished. Brandon says in January (the latest reporting month), Hilltop provided over 2 thousand "free meals for the Early Learning and Care children through the Child and Adult Care Food Program. We claimed 717 free meals for school aged children."
