Why Water is Life Kenya?

When St. Philip's began its turnaround 22 years ago, we started having some extra money; and it didn't take long for social service agencies in our area to take notice of both our desire to help and our ability (financially) to help. And they wanted us to give money . . . federal funding of nonprofits began to decline at that time (as it has continued to do) and agencies needed money to keep doing the great things they were doing. But we wanted projects that transformed us . . . it is one thing to write a check for a group like Friendship House or LCS . . . it is another thing to be in partnership with them so that not only are the lives of those they serve transformed, but that we are transformed as well.

That thinking was why we partnered with LCS to start our Produce Distribution, which later became our Grocery Club, which exists to this day. Serving dozens and dozens of families each month providing supplemental groceries. It costs us thousands of dollars each month to keep that program going. But more than that . . . our volunteers know these clients and their struggles, and their families - if you are a part of that ministry, you are invested in the lives of the people who come and you know that they receive not just food coming here, but they are given a little taste of loving community too.

That thinking is why when Friendship House wanted our money to help their homeless, we researched and started the Family Promise network here in New Castle County. We discovered that not one homelessness ministry/agency provided sheltering that would keep a husband/wife and kids together and so homeless families were broken up during that time and boys over age 9 could not stay with their moms in any shelter at that time. St. Philip's spearheaded Family Promise to shelter families in our churches and keep families together while they were going through difficult times. We alone in 2007 chartered and incorporated it as a 501(c)(3), raised \$110,000.00, found a day center, bought a van, hired an executive director, and recruited 12 other churches to make the network whole. Then we gave it away to the community and it has been a massive success . . . now there are more than 30 churches involved . . . they have their own facility where the families are housed.

These are two of the examples of ministries where we took huge leaps to do something big - it was more than doing a hunger walk or giving money or check writing . . . we made a big commitment. We called it "majoring in the majors." It is when we take these leaps to do big, exciting things, that we are transformed. We learn something about the people that we are serving because there is a personal and long term commitment not just to a task, but a commitment to their humanity and their personhood and their well being.

This is what is being envisioned with Water is Life Kenya. All of these ministries involve money, as does this one. But more than that, WILK, like Family Promise and Grocery Club... takes a commitment not just to give, but to transform an entire community permanently. The goal is to take \$80,000 to do the engineering surveys and research, dig a clean water well in Kenya, and then create a storage facility that is elephant proof. Our hope is to even send representatives from St. Philip's over there to dedicate the well and create a connection between the Masai people and St. Philip's. In doing this, water is the start of developing a new life for the people there, whose women spend most of their time fetching water. With clean water, children can go to school because they are clean and don't have to help with water collection; women can begin to work earning money for their families; and the entire community is transformed.

This is what majoring in the majors looks like and it is why we expand parking lots and basements . . . so that we can welcome in more people who want to be part of this kind of ministry that is transforming lives in the world. And I think WILK fits right into what we are about as people who Serve the Community. In fact, the Outreach team here at St. Philip's already has several excited volunteers who are leading this project and have started meeting with WILK folks and making plans. The hope is that we'll be able to start this work either in late 2024 or early 2025 with the goal of having that well producing water sometime in 2025. And then from there we get to follow along with this community as life begins to develop for them. We'll figure out what that engagement looks like as we move forward.





Dear Friends: Your Church Council has been busy working with the Capital Campaign Committee on our current initiatives.

By now you have picked up or received the folder containing materials for the Capital Campaign for which we are currently involved. On the front of the folder are the words: "We can do all things through God who strengthens us." I have seen this scripture many times in my life. I've seen it on plaques to hang in your house, on stones, on jewelry and much more. It is one of the most quoted and misquoted bible verses. If I look up Philippians 4:13 in my Women's Devotional Bible, it states:" I can do all **this** through him who gives me strength." In my Life Application Study Bible, it states:" For I can do **everything** through Christ who gives me strength." So, what does this passage mean to you? Does it mean strength for one thing or everything? Does it mean give me strength right now?

Several years ago, during a Koinonia session we were asked to share our favorite piece of scripture with the group. Also, several years ago we were given a Discipleship Journal with our favorite bible quote on the cover. You guessed it! Mine was Philippians 4:13. Since that time I have spent many hours reading what commentators have said about this verse. One of the things I have learned is to not take it out of context.

Does it mean that Christ will give us strength to do all that we want? Will he give us strength to cure disease? Homelessness? Maybe even war? In my search for meaning, I have found that you need to read the entire passage—what comes before and after. If we do that here, Paul is telling us it's not about realizing our personal dreams but being content with God's will.

I've recently come across some interpretation of this passage by Lynn Cohick, a Distinguished Professor of the New Testament & Director of the Houston Theological Seminary at Houston Christian University. Dr Cohick asserts that these verses are not a blanket endorsement that God will support anything we set out to do or empower us to do whatever impossible things we can imagine, but it is an assurance that we can do whatever God calls us to do, not whatever we decide to do. It is an endorsement that God can give us strength to be content no matter what.

I think that is what we are doing at St. Philip's. He is calling us to do His work. We are not only creating a space for worshipping and praising God, but also, as John Newcomer mentioned in his letter, by supporting water security in Kenya, we are given the opportunity to support the mission outside of our walls that God has put before us. As always: His will be done!

Armenian-American, abstract-expressionist painter, Arshile Gorky (1904 – 1948), once said, "I believe in everlastingness. I never finish a painting. I just stop working on it for a while."

As an artist myself, one aspect of my career has been abstract-expressionistic painting and like Gorky, when working on a painting in this manner, it's everlastingness is apparent. I can say that I never finish an abstract-expressionist painting. I just stop working on it for a while. Unless sold or given away it will exist, perhaps forever, with potential for change.

This painter's perspective helps me understand God's creative purpose and perhaps my part in God's creation. Like God's paint brush, paint, or canvas, I can be an instrument in God's creative work, believing that work to be for peace, love, and kindness. As I work alongside other church council members, I see our willingness to progress at St. Philip's Lutheran Church as we are able and as God inspires us to move forward. In the three years as a member and one year that I have been on council, I have seen this congregation and its leaders embrace gender equality, environmental sustainability, racial justice, the plight of refugees, mission-based fiscal responsibility, and love of our neighbors. We are painting that part of God's canvas that God has entrusted to us here and beyond St. Philip's Lutheran Church and it is an everchanging everlasting canvas for sure. We are his instruments of creation. The peace prayer of St. Francis of Assisi says it best...

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; and where there is sadness, joy. O Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen. **O.W.L.S. 

# An exciting ministry has returned to St. Philip's! "DINNERS OF EIGHT"

There is within all three Abramic Faiths (Judaism, Christianity, Islam) a deep appreciation for and practice of hospitality. In the modern era, there are few opportunities available to experience its main expression, that is, meal fellowship. "Dinners of Eight" seeks to offer members of our congregation, their friends, and, possibly in time, people of other faiths, opportunities to experience each other. It is a smaller gathering (eight is a manageable number to fit around a dinner table allowing those with smaller homes to also participate as host), relatively easy to pull off, and, once established, tends to sustain and grow itself.

Signup sheets have been posted in the Narthex allowing all congregation members the opportunity to join a "dinner of eight". Those that choose to host should provide the main course and ask the others coming to dinner to bring an appetizer, vegetable, salad, or dessert. The offering of wine and/or beer should be decided by the whole group.

After meeting and sharing dinner, it is encouraged that the guests then host a dinner of their own, which is again open to the members of the congregation to join. Following these gatherings, the ministry would expand again in the same way with the guests hosting their own "dinner of eight". # PRAYERS FOR AYITI'S [HAITI'S] FORGIVENESS

With honor and respect to the indigenous Taino people of the Caribbean and **Ayiti [the original Amer-Indian name for Haiti]** who were destroyed by war, disease, and slavery after Christopher Columbus's discovery of Ayiti in 1492.

First, I must express respect and honor for all efforts by many people who are in a right relationship with Ayiti's people. Many have joined the people of Ayiti to help them survive and succeed. Organizations like N a Sonje Foundation, Groundswell International, Beyond Borders, Doctors Without Borders, Haiti Partners, the United Nations, and more are doing abundant work to help Ayiti develop despite the many obstacles to progress Ayiti has faced.

The very hopeful and independent people of Ayiti have survived many abuses to this day, trying to solve as many problems as possible on their own, but Ayiti is now in her most dire of straits. Decades of gang violence has escalated into a situation in which smaller gangs are uniting into army-gangs and violently fighting for control of the country.


The reasons why Ayiti is experiencing the violence, chaos, and disorganization we see today are many and varied, but most reasons can be cast clearly upon the past oppressive relationships that the white European ancestors of Spain [from 1492 through the 1600s], then of France [through the 1700s], and then of the U.S. [from 1803 to the present] have imposed upon Ayiti's black, African, kidnapped, enslaved, and abused people.

In January of 1804, not long after our own U.S. Declaration of Independence from England in 1776, Ayiti declared its independence from France, having defeated France by destroying Napoleon's Caribbean armada in 1803. Soon after that France sold the Louisiana Purchase to the U.S. This was a great benefit to the U.S. Ayiti gained no such benefit.

In fact, no country would recognize this now sovereign nation of freed black slaves. In doing so would have jeopardized their own slave empires and this included the U.S. This tactic effectively cut off all international discourse with Ayiti. The many abuses of Ayiti continue over the next two centuries and that information is easily found with Internet searches for "Timelines of Haiti Oppression" or similar phrases.

I don't know what solutions are possible now. I fear every day for the people I have grown close to and love in Ayiti. They face danger every day and anxiously await possible Humanitarian Parole to the U.S. through sponsorships by U.S. citizens.

Work toward repairing and sustaining positive relations with Ayiti should be a goal for us. Perhaps all we can do is offer prayers for their safety with hope for the reestablishment of a viable government, for protection from violence, for restoration of their beautiful land and of all their human rights, and finally for their forgiveness of us for our part in these problems.

#### Water is Life Kenya Update

By now you have heard about the St Philip's capital campaign and the plans to use a portion of the funds raised for a major outreach project in Kenya. St Philip's plans to work with Water is Life Kenya, a local nonprofit, to drill a well and provide life giving fresh water to a rural community in Kenya. Sarah Swift and Amanda DeWeese of the outreach committee are leading a team to work with WILK on the details as this project develops over the coming months. # A few excerpts from the WILK website:

The Maasai people of Kenya say: Enkare Enkishui, Water is Life. Without water, families suffer, livestock die, and life all-too-often ends. That's why Water is Life Kenya (WILK), a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization based in Delaware, exists — to spark personal, economic, and community development in marginalized communities in Kenya, according to existing customs and culture, by providing clean water, sanitation and hygiene, empowering women, and equipping people to develop income by managing their resources.

We operate according to these impactful and empowering guiding principles:

- Love your neighbor as yourself
- Don't do for others what they can do for themselves
- Involve the community at every phase of the project
- Real lasting change will occur when people recognize the reality around them and their ability, with others, to change it.

We work with Maasai communities in southern Kenya, specifically Kajiado County. Thus far, we have brought clean water and economic growth to 35 communities, impacting tens of thousands of men, women and children.

The day-to-day reality of the communities we serve is often dire, and their challenges are primarily caused by a drought-prone climate and lack of sustainable access to clean water, exacerbated by climate change.

People fight water-borne diseases, women and girls walk six or more hours every day to find water to survive, children are so thirsty they can hardly participate in education, and men despair because their cattle are dying.

Average Water Conditions in southern Kenya:

- Average distance to water: 4 miles
- Average rainfall: 15 inches/year
- Average time spent fetching water: 4 hours a day per family
- Diseases caused by fouled water: Diarrhea, Typhoid, Cholera, Dysentery
- Percentage of households in rural villages with no toilet or latrine: 92%
- Livestock losses during periods of drought (such as 2010, 2017, and 2022)
- e.g. Up to 80% of the total cattle herd died in 2009-2010

But there is hope thanks to the—literally—groundbreaking work WILK has accomplished since 2007 to bring clean, accessible, sustainable water to drought-prone, rural communities.

#### The Bayard School Food Hub Grand Opening

We are excited to announce that Monday, April 8th was the start of our Healthy Food Hub at The Bayard School in Wilmington. The program allowed students and their families to receive fruits, vegetables, low-fat proteins, whole grains, and other healthy foods.

In the first day of the program, Maria was present, both receiving her initial selection of food and helping translate for other parents. She expressed her gratitude by saying, "This program is a gift from God; I can't thank all of you enough!

Antoinette, mother of William a Bayard student, was also there to collect food, "If you're not getting your nutrition, you're looking forward to aches and pains. I'm just so grateful for this program and that we have the opportunity to participate. And just really really excited!"

Participants are also provided with a unique learning opportunity to help them nourish their families. The University of Delaware Cooperative Extension is presenting a six week Around the Table course that includes mind-fulness, live demonstrations, meal planning, and nutritional information.

LCS is looking forward to taking this next step in bringing our approach of Food is Medicine to our clients. Expanding on the lessons we learned from the Delaware Food Farmacy, Food is Medicine aims to improve the quality of health by providing healthy foods and the skills needed to utilize them.

"I'm really grateful that so many partners have agreed to help us bring this important program into schools," said Rob Gurnee, Executive Director of LCS. In addition to the University of Delaware nutrition training, the Food Hub is also supported by a ChristianaCare Community Health Worker, and a partnership with Children and Families First. Funding for this program was generously provided by Christ Church Christiana Hundred. A portion of the food will also be provided by local Delaware farmers under an agreement LCS has with the Delaware Department of Agriculture.

Youth Services Coordinator, Teresa Allen, says the students worked together on their projects. "Our K-1st grade friends read *Green Eggs and Ham* in small groups, while our 2nd-3rd grade friends tackled *The Lorax*. Our big kid friends in 4th-5th grade read *The Sneetches*. All the stories focused on trying new things and looking at different situations from all perspectives, not just our own, and how, in doing that, you can potentially make yourself feel better on the inside."


