
Happy June, everyone!

In his book, *The Road*, Cormac McCarthy tells the story of a father and a son walking alone through a burned and devastated America. Nothing moves in the ravaged land-scape except the ash on the wind. It is cold enough to crack stones, and when the snow falls it is gray. This father and son are on a journey to the coast, having no clue what awaits them there. It is the story of an image of the future in which no hope remains, except that the father and son are sustained by their love for one another.

Throughout the book, there is this theme of fire. Naturally, as travelers on the road of a dystopian America, fire would be very important. They are constantly looking for wood to start a fire, waking up to a fire that's almost burned out. The father holds the son close to the fire to warm him at night. But this theme of fire isn't just about the fire that burns outside – it is about the fire that burns *within*. And not the heart-burn, acid reflux kind. The father and son have this phrase they use together on the road – "we're carrying the fire", they say.

Early in the book, late at night, the boy says to his dad, "We're going to be okay, aren't we Papa?" "Yes, we are", the father replies. "And nothing bad is going to happen to us?" the boy asks. "That's right," the father replies. "Because we're carrying the fire," the boys asks. "Yes," the father says. "Because we're carrying the fire." Towards the end of the story, the father has grown sick. He's developed a terrible cough and he knows his death is near. And he tells his son to go on without him. "I want to be with you", the boy says. "You can't, son." "Please, Papa." "You can't. You have to carry the fire" the father replies. "Is it real? The fire, Papa?" "Yes it is, son." "Where is it? I don't know where it is" the boy says. "Yes you do. It's inside you. It was always there. I can see it" the father replies.

As we enter into summertime, and the heat starts to settle in, may we be reminded of the heat of the fire we carry inside of all of us. It is in baptism that we are given the Holy Spirit and we are called to use that fire we have for the good of our neighbors and community. For we have a God who overcame death & the grave - *when the flame seemed to have gone out forever*. But God proved it never would happen through Jesus. Blessings to you and your families this summer! The Lord goes with you.

This got me thinking that several years ago, it was suggested to the members of St. Philip's that we might want to identify scripture that we found especially meaningful in our lives and then place it on paper or other media where we might see it often.


This devotional reminded me of a phrase from Paul's letter to the Romans that included: "nothing can ever separate us from God's love…neither our fears for today nor our worries about tomorrow".

As I have thought about that message it truly resonated with me. Like me, I suspect that you have good days and bad days. Days when inspiration and accomplishment of good works is at the forefront. And days when you are distressed, worried, and wonder if you can get through the week.

And that is my thought for you, and for me, today. As we exit the wonder of the Easter season where we have worshiped, and celebrated with friends and family perhaps there are pitfalls awaiting us in the weeks ahead.

If you have a portion of scripture that touches your heart, I invite you to call on it in those times. And, if you don't have anything specific, I offer you these words from Paul, that God is always there for us to help us deal with *our fears for today and our worries about tomorrow*.

He is always there for us. Have a great summer!



Worry is a conversation with yourself about things you cannot change. Prayer is a conversation you have with God about things he can change.

If you know me, you know that I am a doer. If something needs to be done, I will just do it, and I normally do not ask for help.

But what if something needs to be done that is not in your control. You need someone's help to physically complete the task or simply their knowledge to compensate for your lack thereof. What do you do then? Do you begin to worry about how you are going to get this done? Who are you going to ask (or burden). What if nobody comes to mind from your inner circle? What if you don't have an inner circle? Cue the spiraling.

Does this sound familiar?

God does not want you to focus on things that are outside of your control. God wants you to trust him instead of ruminating on worrisome things all day long. God wants you to stop worrying so you can have victory in Jesus.

Matthew 6:25-27,34

²⁵"Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more important than food, and the body more important than clothes? ²⁶Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? ²⁷Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life? ³⁴Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own."

I know this seems easier said than done. But here are 4 easy ways that we can help relieve the worry in our lives.

- Surrender your worries to God.
 - Stay in the present moment.
 - Meditate on God's word.
- Declare the truth about your situation.



From the Racial Justice Task Force - Rev. Dave Mueller

It was a sunny late afternoon. I had official permission to cross town to pick up my wife and infant daughter, who had spent the day with our congregation's organist.

Gigi was on the floor under the glove compartment closely holding Kristin. As instructed, we drove at 15 miles/hour. In the two miles to our apartment on the east side of town, we passed four check points. The badge on the first policeman we encountered was embossed "Columbus."

On the roofs of the two or three story buildings, on the north side of Main Street there were hundreds of police with rifles at the ready. On the south, I saw what had to be at least several dozen ambulances, waiting and ready to move at a moments notice. A half dozen helicopters flew low overhead.

It was May 4, 1970, Kent, Ohio. Earlier in the day, four students were killed and seven injured as the National Guard opened fire on the Kent State University commons.

I presume that on the 54th anniversary of May 4 of this year, associations with present protests about the war in Israel and Gaza are inevitable. I am going to avoid listing and commenting on how extremely different the protests of the 1960s and the present are. Instead, I offer another association many of us have forgotten, namely, about war protests and racial ones.

I was in a meeting with Fred Hampton, Deputy Chair of the Black Panther party in 1970. Two weeks later he was killed in Chicago by the police, shot in his bed. In those days, the BP party was asking for 13 States in the south for their own country. I clearly remember suggesting that within some period of time, some number of their own would exploit them. I believed over 50 years ago and still do, that regardless of race, religion, or other differences, humans are humans. We have a "fallen" penchant for conflict.

That said, what associations might be made between the Black Power movement of the 1960s, the "Black Lives Matter" movement of recent years, and the state of racial relations today? While some may have feelings about how far we have come, statistics on nearly everything from economic disparities to mortality rates remain greatly concerning.

Are there appropriate and potentially effective places for churches, black and white, to work together to overcome the disparities and heal the breaches? A black Kent State professor, I met "in the street" after the May 4 disaster shared: "If you want to get to know me, don't study me but work with me."

"We completed Phonics and Word Recognition File Folder Games that help students demonstrate knowledge of lettersound correspondences and associate long and short vowel sounds with common spellings."

Renaissance Learning Assessments.


