Update on the Building Expansion Projects

Things are moving right along with the Capital Expansion projects that we are working on. Of course, one large part of this project is the clean water well we are digging in Kenya. There's lots of information later on in this newsletter that will fill you in on what's happening there. Plus, by the time you read this, we'll be very close to the September 29th Lunch and Learn presentation on that project. So, I'll keep my report to the projects right here in our building and grounds.

Expansion of the Basement and Installation of Elevator

So, a few weeks ago we submitted the plans for the basement to New Castle County to obtain a building permit. We also have received the bids for all the relevant parts of the construction (electrical, plumbing, drywall, painting, etc.) and we are not at the point that we are just waiting for New Castle County to give us the building permit. According to our own, Tom Krapf, we should have that permit in hand any day now. Our expectation is that we will be able to start working down there as soon as the next week or two.

In fact, we have already secured temporary storage for everything that is currently in the basement so that we can move everything into a "POD" during construction. That's our indicator that things are imminent.

Expansion of the Parking Lot

This has been the longer process with New Castle County because it doesn't just involve a building permit. We had to submit an entirely new site plan that is revised to reflect the new parking lot. That approval process takes a lot longer than the basement. However, we started that process long before we ran our capital campaign. That means that we are pretty far down the road with New Castle County. We have preliminary approval of our plan - enough that we were able to put our project out to bid. We have all our bids in hand and we are now finalizing our choice of which bid to accept. Depending on which bid we accept, we can probably start working on the parking lot as soon as November.

The expectation is that the project outside will take 13 weeks or so to complete once it is started.

As soon as we get going, keep you eyes out for pictures of the progress of the projects!!

The Blessing of the Animals - A brief worship service held on Sunday, Oct. 6th at 12pm


What is D-O-G spelled backwards? Answer: G-O-D! Animals are glimpses of God and all are invited to come and bring their animals and pets for a blessing!

"The animals of God's creation inhabit the skies, the earth, and the sea. They share in the fortunes of human existence and have a part in human life. God, who confers gifts upon all living things, has often used the service of animals or made them symbolic reminders of the gifts of salvation. Animals were saved from the flood and afterwards made a part of the covenant with Noah [Genesis 9:9-10]. The paschal lamb brings to mind the Passover sacrifice and the deliverance from the bondage of Egypt [Exodus 12:3-14]; a giant fish saved Jonah [Jonah 2:1-11]; ravens brought bread to Elijah [I Kings 1:6]; animals were included in the repentance enjoined on humans [Jonah 3:7]. And animals share in Christ's redemption of all of God's creation. We therefore ask for the divine blessing on these precious animals. As we do this, let us praise our Creator and thank God for making us stewards over these precious creatures of the earth."

Do any of these phrases register with you? "When in the course of Human Events"

- "A new nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal..."
- "Today I consider myself the luckiest man on the face of the earth"
- "Sharing horizons that are new to us, Watching the signs along the way"

I suspect that your answer is likely yes. The Declaration of Independence, the Gettysburg Address, Lou Gehrig's Farewell Speech, and the Carpenters' "We've Only Just Begun" strike a chord with many of us.

How about Bible verses? We all likely have several verses that resonate with us and bring us some sort of comfort or peace or lasting memory. But, do you have a "Life Bible Verse"? To help you figure it out, my questions for today are, What is a Life Bible Verse? and, How do I find it?

I recently came across an article that posed these very questions and found it interesting and inspiring to consider the topic. In fact, the article suggested that a Life Bible Verse is a Bible verse or any small passage of inspirational Scripture that speaks to your heart directly. It's one of those verses that you feel was written just for you and jumps off the page whenever you read it.

So, how did I (and how do you) find your Life Bible Verse? (Note: this is not a test, and there is no right or wrong answer...this is a fun, and hopefully inspiring, exercise during which God will speak to you.)

Here are the five easy steps to follow as you search for your own Life Bible Verse:

Write down your favorite Bible verses - the ones that come quickly to your mind.

Read the verses aloud and "listen" to the message. Pick two or three of these pieces of Scripture, write them individually on a Post-It note or other paper, and place them where you will see them all daily. Take your time to consider them, even memorize them, and ask if they encourage you, or give you hope, or bring you a sense of peace, or inspire you. Pray over the verses you have selected. Does one of them give you rest, peace of mind, inspiration for your life? If so, that is your Life Bible Verse.

You may want to post your Life Bible Verse where you see it daily, and you may want to share it with family and friends, but most of all, you can use it to help you share the ups and downs of life and your Love of God.

I liked the article that I read, and I did the exercise as outlined. I started with five verses that I had previously considered as the ones most comforting and supportive to me. It turns out, my Life Bible Verse is Philippians 4:13. I find that as I face times of trouble or pressure, I ask the Lord to strengthen me to deal with them.

I hope that you find this exercise as meaningful and fulfilling as I did. In today's hectic world, I know that it is comforting for me to have my Life Bible Verse to turn to whenever I need it.



Facing the Future with Assurance from God

In a world of 24/7 media coverage, we are constantly exposed to the fear, chaos, and uncertainty of thetimes: the economy, global warfare, racial injustice, climate change just to name a few. It seems likewery election cycle polarizes us and generates even more fear, chaos, and uncertainty. This is oftenused to invoke very powerful emotions that can be used to manipulate a divide us.

As followers of Christ, what can we do?

As Christians, it is how we respond that is far more important. What seems overwhelming, important, and urgent today will pale as it fits into a far larger plan...God's plan. Christ followers need to keep the "big picture" in mind in order to face the future with confidence.

To those who feel threatened because of the current crisis and chaos, remember God is sovereign. The Lord has used all kinds of leaders, from all kinds of backgrounds, with all kinds of idiosyncrasies to orchestrate and fulfill His sovereign purposes in world history. Today is no exception.

For those who feel disappointed and hopeless because of the growing evil, immorality, and persecutionthey may be experiencing, God reminds us that trials are inevitable. Living in the United States does not preclude us from these realities. We must adjust our expectations accordingly.

Finally, and most importantly, we must remember that we are called by God to be the Salt and Light of the world. Light brings life, healing, love, and holiness. Light prays for those that persecute them, lovestheir enemies, and does good deeds of kindness to all people so they will glorify their Father in heaven. Light shines brightest in the darkness, and crisis and difficulties are not only times of chaos, but of greatopportunity.

Now is not the time to blame, withdraw, retreat, or lose hope. We cannot control what has or will

happen in our country, the world, or our circumstances, but we can control how we respond! Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. The challenges of southern Kenya are primarily caused by a drought-prone climate and lack of sustainable access to clean water, exacerbated by climate change.

People fight water-borne diseases, women and girls walk six or more hours every day to find water to survive, children are so thirsty they can hardly participate in education, and men despair because their cattle are dying.

Average Water Conditions in southern Kenya:

- Average distance to water: 4 miles
- Average rainfall: 15 inches/year
- · Average time spent fetching water: 4 hours a day per family
- Diseases caused by fouled water: Diarrhea, Typhoid, Cholera, Dysentery
- · Percentage of households in rural villages with no toilet or latrine: 92%
- Livestock losses during periods of drought (such as 2010, 2017, and 2022)
 - e.g. Up to 80% of the total cattle herd died in 2009-2010

WILK's success is not only extremely important for the long-term economic development of the community, but also for the opportunities available to women. In most Maasai families, women and girls are charged with securing clean water, leaving little time for other pursuits. At **one well alone**, 1,936,000 hours annually were freed up for women and girls who no longer must walk 12 hours a day in search of water. This has opened the door to educational opportunities, improved physical health, increased safety by not traveling alone long distances, and unleashed new economic activities and entrepreneurial spirit. Through WILK programs, women blossom into entrepreneurs with powerful leadership skills, all while gaining much needed income for their families.

As out Church Community expands our efforts with international efforts in Kenya and helping another Sudanese family to settle in the US. We have had some additional training, and a new concept (for me) was brought up. This concept is Ethnocentrism and according to Cambridge is "the belief that the people, customs, and traditions of your own race or country are better than those of other races or countries".

We need to think deeply about how we interact with others in other cultures, so we do judge or compare their ways of life by our own environment. The book on the Maasai really got me thinking how when we encourage western values and education, we can be sowing the seeds of dissatisfaction by assuming that their path to success is the same as ours. Technology and

education must be carefully introduced so they can maintain the way of life that they have been happy with for hundreds of years. As an example, it may be more beneficial to help with teaching ways to keep the grasslands sustainable for their cattle, rather than a western

education that has little application to their community. We just need to understand more about their culture and what their true needs are rather than assuming what works for us will work for them.

I pray that our efforts promote their well-being, and we do not sow dissatisfaction by

Introducing change that upsets their way of life. What we are trying to do is a great ministry, and we just need to try and view things from their point of view.
