From the Associate Pastor - Pastor Amy

Grace and peace to you always.

The month of November always makes me think of the Sarah Addison Allen quote: "It looked like the world was covered in a cobbler crust of brown sugar and cinnamon." I just love that.

The month of November brings with it great thankfulness for all that we have - the gifts that God gives us. Family, friends, health, safety, love, and peace; all gifts from God. This month, if you're like me, makes me reflect on all the people in my life, especially those who are now with God in Heavenly joy.

I think the big reason for that is because the first Sunday of this month, here at church, is All Saints Sunday. It is a Sunday to remember and celebrate the lives of those who have gone before us into the heavenly Kingdom of God and the new babies born into this world. You'll notice the paraments change to white. The bright white color pops up as a stark contrast to the green paraments we have had for a number of weeks. This bright white reminds us of the resurrection hope found in Jesus Christ. That even if we walk through the valley of the shadow of death we will fear no evil because our God is for us and with us. That we will dwell in the house of the Lord forever (Psalm 23). That God brings new life every single day.

No matter what this month of November brings, this is a season to give thanks for all that God has given us and continues to give us. I know I am especially grateful and thankful to be serving as one of the pastors here at St. Philip's as it is this month that marks my one-year anniversary in being called and serving here. I am overflowing in thankfulness for you all and for this church!

May we see the world "covered in a cobbler crust of brown sugar and cinnamon." May we embrace the different spices of this life, may we look to Creation and see its beauty, and may we find rest and peace in the God who holds our days.

Thanks be to God for you from all of us here at St. Philip's!

From the President - Gerry Butler

Fall is here again, and it's the beginning of the busiest season of the year—at least for me. It's a time when we have lots of family gatherings and lots of other social activities. Getting caught up in all the hoopla tends to make us sometimes forget to thank our Lord for our blessings, in good and even in bad times.

I sometimes look for a prayer of acceptance, courage, and wisdom to help me through those frazzled times. So, I wanted to share with you some thoughts on serenity and particularly, the Serenity Prayer.

If you or I look up the word serenity, definitions such as peace, quietness, coolness, composure, and stillness all appear. I suspect that you, like me, are often in search of serenity in your life. So much is going on with work, with family, with the world, and with life in general, that some time for peace and quiet is something we seek; in fact, it's something that we need and cherish. No, it's not a total escape from all that we need to do, but just a respite of calm and quiet. I find that the best time for this respite is the early morning hours, when I can sit calmly and talk with God.

Have you ever heard of the Serenity Prayer? I am sure you know it or have experienced it, though you may not know the background or even what it's called. It is one of the most well -known prayers today. It has been used in sermons and in Sunday School lessons and studies; a shortened version of the prayer is even part of the Alcoholics Anonymous 12-step program. Reinhold Niebuhr is credited with being the author of the prayer. It was composed in the early 1930's, and it was included in a sermon of his in 1943 and later published by him in 1951. Niebuhr was a theologian and a professor at Union Theological Seminary who won the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1964.

This is the beginning of the Serenity Prayer:

God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference. So how can the Serenity Prayer work for all of us? The analysis I found and studied notes the following: The acceptance of God's plan and His purpose for our lives will bring the serenity that we all seek. The article noted that there are three Biblical Truths in the Serenity Prayer:

- 1. While we may not always know God's plan, we can let go of trying to manage people and events and let God work through us.
- 2. The Holy Spirit gives us the courage to act on God's plan. We can call on that strength to move forward into the full life planned for us.

3. Wisdom is a gift from God which we can pray for and grow in daily to make better decisions.

The Bible tells us, "If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you". James 1:5. If you start to feel a bit overwhelmed, at this time of year or any other time, the Serenity Prayer is there for all of us as we navigate the waters of life and need God's wisdom, help, and assurance. Try it and see.







The students at the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center successfully navigated through the first 2 months of the new school year by acclimating to new classrooms and teachers, celebrating Indigenous Peoples' Day, and even made it past the ghosts and goblins of Halloween! But the big news came from our Executive Director, Michelle Williams. For several years the Hilltop Center has dreamed of expanding its facilities to serve more children and offer more and varied activities for our

students. That dream came closer to reality when Michelle says she "received a call from Governor John Carney on September 30th. He let me know that he will be giving Hilltop \$2 million for the expansion project. The funds will come from the America Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). He let me know that I will be receiving a call from someone in his office soon." This grant comes on the heels of the Delaware General Assembly voting to grant the Center \$1million through the Legislature's Reinvestment Fund. We still have a long way to go to fulfill our dream, but this is very welcome news! Our thanks to the Governor and Delaware General Assembly for these substantial grants.



How the Actual Election Process Can Affect Various Groups

We are privileged in the USA to be able to participate in the election process. I look forward to it. I drive about a mile to the polling place and the longest I have had to wait was five minutes. It is so easy that I take the process for granted. This, however, is not the same experience for many in our country. Some laws have good intentions but often have disproportionate negative consequences for certain groups.

Take, for instance, a voter ID. It sounds like a logical security step. Who determines what forms of ID are acceptable, though? If you have to get an ID at the DMV, some groups, often low-income or those with disabilities, may face significant obstacles. Individuals may not have a copy of a birth certificate due to transiency, homelessness, crises like fire or natural disaster, domestic violence, or family chaos. Many of the teens I worked with as a school counselor, particularly those within the foster care system, had few records, as there was often no parent alive or accessible or the birth parent had substance issues or was incarcerated. DMVs are also less commonly located in cities where public transportation is available and more often located outside the city where a car is needed. One also needs a street address for an ID which has been a problem for some Native Americans who live on reservations.

Decreasing the number of voting drop boxes and polling stations has also been promoted as being fiscally responsible and more secure since there are less areas to monitor. Again, the reductions often occur more frequently in low-income areas. As an example, the Brennan Center for Justice reported Georgia barred counties from having more than 1 drop box per 100,000 voters and limited their locations and hours, causing the number of drop boxes in four metro Atlanta counties to fall from 107 to 25. This leads to longer waiting times at the polls (several hours at some places) with even one state restricting individuals from bringing food or water in line. Low-income individuals also more frequently work in hourly wage positions and are impacted disproportionately with time away from work.

Everyone wants voting vigilance, but it needs to be equitable to all groups.


