# **Building Progress Report for Basement and Parking Lot (and Windows)**

Things are really rolling along with the construction projects we have going on around the church. While the only way you see the basement is if you go down there, the parking lot work will be much more visible very soon. So, be sure to check out the pictures we have in the coming pages of this Guidepost and you'll see what's happening. But, wait, there's more . . .

### **Basement**

The basement has really been moving forward. Tom Krapf and his crew are down there almost every day working. The entire basement is almost entirely framed now. The elevator shaft has been constructed and the "pit" has been dug for beneath the elevator. You can even see how the two restrooms are taking shape. And that is because plumbing has begun to be installed in the men's and women's rooms. Things will begin to get enclosed as soon as the plumbing and electrical and insulation are completed. Keep an eye out for more pictures.

### **Parking Lot**

The contract for the parking lot has been signed and we have all our approvals. Construction on the parking lot should begin before the end of the month with a projected completion date of March or April depending on weather. You should begin to see the area get staked out, silt fencing installed and earth work starting within the next couple weeks.

# Windows

I know this one is surprising you, but we are going to doing work on the windows of the church. For the last couple years we have been dealing with leaks in several of the windows, primarily in the Social Hall. After contacting Anderson Windows, we discovered that the series of windows used in much of the church has a design defect. So, after tireless work by Dave Thompson and John Newcomer, we have a warranty solution provided by Anderson Windows. They will be replacing all the windows in the social hall and they will repair the windows in the rest of the church that are not leaking. The repair work will cost us nothing. The replacement windows will be purchased by Anderson, but we'll have to have an installer put them in. So, there will be some cost that we bear. But, this was an ideal solution given what we could have faced.

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# From the Associate Pastor - Pastor Amy

Advent Greetings to you all,

I am a huge fan of PIE! Pecan, pumpkin, cherry, blueberry, French silk: you name it! As long as it's served with ice cream I am good! But there is a pie I don't like: the math, 3.14159 kind. I remember struggling in my 10th grade geometry class with my compass. This lesson was all about drawing a perfect circle and I remember how much I struggled to make and draw a perfect circle. They never seemed good enough. *Anyone else struggle with that, too?* I had to get the right radius so I could find the circumference and I had to plug in all the right formulas. We started talking and learning about finding the area and circumference of a circle using 3.14 for pi. We kept talking about this pi and all it did was make me hungry because my geometry class was close to lunch time.

I was thinking about this memory the other day, and it made me think of a bunch of things that are circles: pie (the food kind), wedding rings and bands, hula hoops, steering wheels, ornaments on your Christmas tree, and one that stands out most to me, during this Advent season, is the Advent wreath that we light for each of the weeks of Advent. It is each candle that we remember the gifts that the Christ child brings into our world everyday: Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love.

One scholar wrote, "The Advent wreath has its roots in the pre-Christian practices of northern Europe. People sought the return of the sun in the dark time of the year (at the winter solstice) by lighting candles and fires. As early as the middle Ages, Christians used fire and light to represent Christ's coming into the world. Using this same symbolism, the Advent wreath developed a few centuries ago in Germany as a sign of the waiting and hopeful expectation of the return in glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. The wreath, a circle, came to represent the eternal victory over death through Jesus Christ. The evergreens were a sign of the faithfulness of God to God's people, even in death, and the lighted candles were a reminder of the light of Christ brought into the world. This symbolism can be just as strong for us today. As is the case with all symbols, they speak most loudly to remind us of God's promises of life."

People of God, we are *encircled* in God's loving care every single day. I think about all of us together, in the different cities and towns and states we all come from. As we draw a circle connecting all of our houses we notice what's in the center: our church. The circle of connection we make is centered in the miracle of Christmas. Thanks be to God. And thanks be to God for you.

God's Hope, Peace, Joy, & Love; be with you always!

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# **Taming the Tongue**

As we navigate the current political landscape in our nation, it's impossible to ignore the unrest and division that surrounds us. Election seasons often bring out the best and worst in us, and the rhetoric can become harsh and divisive. In this challenging climate, we are called to reflect on our faith and the teachings of scripture.

James 3:3-12 offers profound wisdom that is particularly relevant today:

3 When we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we can turn the whole animal. 4 Or take ships as an example. Although they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are steered by a very small rudder wherever the pilot wants to go. 5 Likewise, the tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. Consider what a great forest is set on fire by a small spark. 6 The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil among the parts of the body. It corrupts the whole body, sets the whole course of one's life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell.

7 All kinds of animals, birds, reptiles, and sea creatures are being tamed and have been tamed by mankind, 8 but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. 9 With the tongue, we praise our Lord and Father, and with it, we curse human beings, who have been made in God's likeness. 10 Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this should not be. 11 Can both fresh water and salt water flow from the same spring? 12 My brothers and sisters, can a fig tree bear olives, or a grapevine bear figs? Neither can a salt spring produce fresh water. These verses remind us of the immense power our words hold. In a time of political discord, it's easy to let frustration and anger spill out. Yet, as children of God, we are called to a higher standard. We must remember that everyone, regardless of their political beliefs, is created in the image of God. Let us approach one another with tolerance and respect, understanding that our differences are part of what makes our community rich and diverse. Instead of fueling the fires of division, let us be peacemakers, allowing our words to uplift rather than tear down.

As we engage in discussions—whether in person, online, or within our own families—let's pause and reflect on how we can embody grace and understanding. May our speech reflect the love of Christ, drawing us closer together instead of pushing us apart.

In this season of uncertainty, let us commit to practicing patience with one another, choosing to listen more and judge less. As we do so, we honor not just our fellow human beings, but our Creator as well. May we strive to be vessels of fresh water in a world that often pours out salt.


Annual Babysitting Project and Activity Night on Friday, December 13th from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m.



### From Worship and Music - Louise James

### **HAPPY NEW YEAR!!**

I just wanted to wish all of you a Happy New Year, since the new year starts on Sunday, December 1, 2024. As a liturgical church, Lutherans follow a set order for the year, beginning with Advent, which in 2024 starts on December 1<sup>st</sup>.

As Lutherans, we follow a 3-year cycle of Bible readings. It's nice to know that so many churches around the world are all hearing the same words from the Bible on the same Sunday that we are. If you are interested in learning more about this 3-year lectionary cycle, you can check it out here: <a href="https://www.elca.org/our-work/congregations-and-synods/worship/lectionary">https://www.elca.org/our-work/congregations-and-synods/worship/lectionary</a>.

Another aspect of being a liturgical church is that Lutherans follow a set order for our worship services. At St. Philip's, we occasionally change the music and the actual words used in the liturgy, but the basic order remains the same. The four parts of the service are the Gathering, the Word, the Meal and the Sending.

Gathering: In the gathering, the Holy Spirit brings us together and prepares us to hear the Word of God and receive Christ's body and blood in Holy Communion. The gathering may include confession and forgiveness, song, liturgy that we sing, such as the Kyrie, and prayer.

Word: The congregational hearing of God's word has its roots in Jewish tradition. This time of hearing God's Word, gives everyone time to listen to the Bible readings, interact in the responsive psalm reading, and to prepare to hear the pastor's sermon, based on the readings. We, again, have liturgy that we sing before the Gospel reading. Within the liturgy of the Word, the traditional order has been Old Testament reading, psalm, New Testament reading, gospel acclamation, Holy Gospel, and sermon. The Word portion of the service ends with the Hymn of the Day, which is the congregation's praise-filled response to all that they have heard.

Meal: The liturgical order of the meal comes from the scriptural accounts of the institution of Christ's supper. Jesus "took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and gave it." The table setting, great thanksgiving, breaking of bread, and communion is how Christ's command to "do this in remembrance of me" is lived out today, joining us with the church from earliest times. Again, there is liturgy that we sing throughout the meal portion of the service.

Sending: The sending is to fill the congregation with the desire to follow Christ's command to take God's grace and love into the world. The sending usually contains a blessing, hymn and sending message. "Go in peace. Serve the Lord." "Thanks be to God!"

For those who grew up Lutheran or in other liturgical churches, you probably know about liturgy, but I know that many of our members came to us from non-liturgical churches. Many churches don't follow a liturgical order of service, and that is fine. It's just that Lutherans prefer the unified order of the liturgy.


