As you all know we have been supporting the resettlement of refugees from Sudan for almost five years now. If you have not been around that long and don't know the background of at least one of these families, let me summarize . . . It's a tribal thing . . . And things happening on the national scene affect real people. So, for fun, stop reading for a second and Google the name "Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo, better known as Hemedti." You will find news stories from all over the world cataloging how he is the leader of a paramilitary group battling to take over the country. Well, for one of our families that we have resettled here - they grew up knowing that man and because they are of different tribes/families, he has set out to destroy their family, their entire clan.

While we, in the United States, have respect for our military and our soldiers—they fear theirs. Why? Because of stories like this: One day several years ago, Hemedti and his soldiers came into the village of one of our families and in 90 minutes burned the village and killed 109 members of their family along with our friend's 6 month old daughter. Some of their family has been stranded in refugee camps in Jordan and elsewhere for over 10 years. And any family that remains trapped in Sudan is constantly being threatened or beaten.

I share this with you because this is who we helped to resettle. What's more, a team of our people here at St. Philip's had just finished applying to help host another member of our friend's family who is currently in a Jordanian Refugee Camp. They were people just living their lives like you and me, with homes and jobs. That's gone and now they just want a better life for their families.

However, last week we had to break their hearts and let them know that we would not be able to move forward to help them come to the United States because as of January 20th, every single application for asylum and refugee status has been halted. I am personally saddened because it is easy to take an issue as complex as refugee resettlement and immigration and have no face to put to the issue - and please understand . . . I know those systems need reforming. But one thing Jesus worked to do in his ministry was to move us from just considering the *goodness* or *badness* of an "issue" - to move us from staking out a *position* on an "issue" and rather to see the *people* who are impacted when they find themselves in situations where their lives intersect with the "issues." Thus, it's one thing to feel a particular way about immigration and refugees . . . Liberals and conservatives love to ramble with their talking points about it all the time. It's another to see the horror and just forget the call that Jesus gives to us to "love our neighbors as ourselves." As people of faith we must not forget it.

In any case, I would ask you to pray for our leaders on this "issue," but more than that, pray for the families (Real people) whose lives are at risk because of this change - this kind of change of policy is just what warlords and evil people thrive on. Lord have mercy!








### Plan on joining us!





The EST has been advocating for powering our church in more sustainable ways, relying less on fossil fuel sources, and turning toward solar energy sources. For our purposes we will most often refer to renewable and sustainable energy options as our solar options.

A major consideration currently and as our basement renovation and parking lot expansion projects wrap up this year, is whether or not to transition to a solar energy system, whether to include energy storage, and/or whether to change our electricity provider to one that captures and delivers electricity in renewable ways.

We have received a quote for installing a roof mounted solar panel system. We are in consultation with our Delaware Sustainable Energy Utility company from which we can apply for a "Non-Profit Incentive" grant to help pay for a solar system for our church building. We are informed that non-profits are eligible for an equivalent monetary amount of the Federal Government's 30% Investment Tax Credit (ITC) through its "Direct Pay for Tax Exempt Entities" option. In the event the federal ITC is no longer available, nonprofits will not be held accountable for the 30% balance reimbursed to Energize Delaware. With the Non-Profit

Incentive grant we stand to cover up to 70% of the cost of a solar system installation. Add that to the Direct Pay for Tax Exempt Entities and up to 100% of the cost could be covered. Let's hope for this, right? That's Delaware trying to go solar through non-profits.

We are also looking at possibly changing to a third-party power provider that captures, creates, and distributes energy through renewable methods [solar, wind, water, geothermal] or non-fossil-fuel methods. Such companies include but are not limited to [there are many]: CleanSky Energy, Indra Energy, and CMI [from whom we have a current quote].

### From Environmental Stewardship Team - David Porter

With a third-party electricity provider in place and a solar system covering about 80% of our electricity needs, we could have a complete solar system that provides us with electricity without the need for battery storage.

Stay tuned as we work on the details over these next months.

### OUTSIDE THE CHURCH [THE GROUNDS]:

We are annually renewing a \$4,500 contract with Redtail Restoration and Land Management LLC. to lead us in restoring our woodlands and wetlands property to a more natural and sustainable state. Currently, amidst the parking lot expansion, we have recovered enough land to have planted about 25 new middle level and canopy trees.

Recently, we received notice from Taryn Davidson, Urban and Community Forestry Coordinator for Delaware Forestry Services that her inspection of our tree planting was very positive. We will be reimbursed for some part [perhaps all] of the cost of these trees and be eligible for future grants to plant more. Yay Phil ! Phil and Mary Duncan continue to lead our volunteer efforts in this project with EST and other members working in the forest on the first Saturday and third Wednesday of each month to lop and dig out invasive plants, spread wood chips, plant, water, and care for trees and groundcover and more. Note that management of the rainwater overflow basins has become a big part of these EST members efforts as the new plants directed to us for planting needed additional plantings and care beyond expectations.

This is a lot of physical work so any help will be greatly appreciated!!!!!!!

Near the end of 2024 a line item was established in our church budget for the EST to include the \$4,500 needed for Redtail's services plus \$500 for any additional needs related to our work inside and outside of the church.

The past few weeks have brought great uncertainty for many nonprofit agencies who rely on federal funding to provide essential services to some of the most vulnerable individuals in our society. Funding freezes and grant cancellations impact community-based agencies trying to keep programs running while continuing to pay their staff and keep the lights on. This includes social service programs supported by the Lutheran church and the ELCA. According to the ELCA website (www.elca.org), "[T] he ELCA and 300 health and human service organizations participate in an alliance known as <u>Lutheran</u> <u>Services in America</u>, which serves more than 6 million people each year in the United States and the Caribbean. That's one in 50 Americans every year. As part of this alliance and mission, we support more than 285 social ministry organizations affiliated with the ELCA." *Lutheran Community Services* in Wilmington is part of this alliance. Another Lutheran organization you may be familiar with is *Glob-al Refuge* (f/k/a Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services), which provides services to refugees and immigrants through local partners in numerous states including Maryland and Pennsylvania. (HIAS/Jewish Family Services of Delaware provide the same type of refugee resettlement services here in Delaware.)

Both Lutheran social services and Global Refuge have found themselves unwelcome targets of social media attacks recently. In early February is when I first read about an accusation that Lutheran social services was accepting illegal payments from the federal government and engaging in money laundering. My first reaction was Huh? Is this some kind of joke?? But it turned out that these were real attacks being amplified on social media, to the point where the ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton had to put out a video statement debunking this false claim. If you aren't familiar with what happened, here is an article describing the incident (<u>https://religionnews.com/2025/02/03/musk-spotlights-federal-funds-for-lutheran-social-services-calls-them-illegal-payments/</u>) and the video response from Bishop Eaton (<u>https://youtu.be/Liqz0VdZG1E?si=Vr38A002iIR2NIWI</u>) A crazy world we live in right now.

Any extra support we might be able to give to the service organizations in our local community, our country, or the wider world would no doubt be much appreciated in these turbulent times, whether it be financial or donations of time or goods. Our own Grocery Club, the food pantries of Lutheran Community Services, Family Promise of Delaware, JFS Delaware, Global Refuge, Lutheran World Relief and many more worthy organizations are out there every day serving those who are in need.







#### Staying Healthy at Hilltop

Health and staying healthy is an overall theme of operations at the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center this winter.



Leading the charge are our Pre-School Threes who, according to our Early Childhood Education Coordinator, Dashaba Fielder, used "construction paper, crayons and glue, (to) create their own Healthy Foods Plate. Everyone's plate included carrots, celery, broccoli and lots of fruit. The children were introduced to some new fruits and vegetables such as avocado, Brussel sprouts and Dragon fruit! The children also enjoyed dancing in their classrooms to exercise music."

Meanwhile, Hilltop Executive Director, Michelle Williams, says she is looking for grant money to keep the ball rolling around good health. "I submitted a \$10,000 mini grant to Delaware Advancing Healthy Lifestyles Program to pilot healthy lifestyles interventions.... We are looking to create an inclusive ECE (Early Childhood Education) environment that improves children's physical fitness and a culture of healthier eating for generations to come."

It may only be March, but plans are well underway for the 2025 edition of the Hilltop Summer Camp. Center Youth Services Coordinator, Teresa Allen, reports that "as of the end of January, the summer application (is) completed. This year's (camp) theme is 'Summer of STREAM,' meaning: science, technology, reading, engineering art and math." Teresa says the summer planning process includes adding new camp staff members.

One of the many goals of our camp is elimination of summer student learning down time.



To that end, Center Executive Director, Michelle Williams met with the Chief Executive Officer of United Way of Delaware (UWDE), Michelle Taylor, about summer reading outcomes. "Her big push is reading by 3rd grade. She saw an increase in the literacy scores for Hilltop over the summer and wants to collaborate more to help politicians understand the importance of UWDE's early literacy initiative. She also let me know that the summer funding ...

information will come out in March."

Finally, last month we told you about the new food closet at Hilltop, thanks to a \$5,000 donation of nonperishable food items from DOTS Foods. According to Center Deputy Director, Brandon Furrowh, the closet is up and running, "The food pantry officially opens



from 12:00 to 5:00 pm on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. The items available for families include peanut butter, crackers, granola bars, cereal, mashed potatoes, chicken, green beans, corn, cookies, and more. Hilltop staff will engage local churches and community members for continued food donations to make this closet sustainable."


