

Basement and Parking Lot Construction Update

The construction is moving right along. The basement is now just about complete. The carpet and flooring is in, the doors are on and the bathrooms and classrooms are complete as well. The elevator even works. The last items to be completed are the room signs. They have been slow to come in, but should be here any day. Once that is done, we'll be able to have our final inspections and the basement will be open for business.

The parking lot out back has been more of a problem. The winter weather with the extreme cold and multiple snows has delayed that project by about a month. While we haven't had enough rain to pull us out of our prolonged drought, it has still be enough to create wet conditions out back. Because of that, we had to bring in "stone dust" to try to help absorb the wet soil. Why is that important? Because when they compact it to build on it, they can't have their machines sinking in the mud—that's not a good surface to build on.

So as it stands we have about 46 days of work out back - our goal of having it done before





Easter Sunday is definitely in jeopardy. We are absolutely pushing to get it done as quickly as we can and, in fact, work resumed on the back part of the property on March 26th. Hopefully, if the weather cooperates they can keep on working and get us to the point where at least we might have stone in the back lot by Easter. That would help us with the crowds we usually have on that wonderful day.

In the spirit of Easter, this story always manages to touch me and I pray it does for you, too: "Excuse me," said the young man, standing awkwardly at the open church door. "I'm here to pick up an Easter basket for my daughter. Am I in the right place?" "Well, we have baskets, but they're not Easter baskets for kids; they're food baskets," I explained. That morning I had arrived early at St. Michael's Episcopal Church here in Carmichael, California, to help distribute the baskets to needy families for Easter. To make sure everyone was taken care of, we had handed out numbers to the recipients that matched the basket they were supposed to receive. Each one contained a full Easter dinner—a whole ham, potatoes, bread, vegetables and a pie—plus enough staples to help feed a family for a week.

"Why don't you come in?" I offered the man. He looked disappointed. He shook his head, and peered over his shoulder. "I can't...my daughter is waiting for me in the car," he said. He gave her a little wave and turned back toward me. "I'm grateful for the food, but when I heard you were giving away baskets for Easter...well, I thought they would be Easter baskets for children," he continued. "I promised my daughter one." He glanced over his shoulder again. "I left her in the car because I wanted to surprise her." I felt bad, but there was nothing we could do. Our volunteers had put together food baskets, not Easter ones. We didn't have the means to make up anything else.

The man handed me his number, and I walked over to where the baskets were waiting for pick up. A bulge in one of the baskets caught my eye. What is that? I wondered. Leaning in and looking more closely, I could see, unmistakably, an Easter basket—filled with an assortment of candy and Easter eggs—wrapped with ribbons and tucked inside with the food. "One of the volunteers must have added it by mistake!" I thought. Then I looked at the man's number in my hand. Well, I'll be...

"Happy Easter," I said to the man, handing him the only food basket with an Easter basket inside—the very same basket with his number on it. "Someone knew just what you needed." Someone sure did...

It's amazing what God can do! May we continue to be the Easter People we are called to be.

Lent is a time of introspection, a period to examine our hearts and align ourselves more closely with Christ. Just as Jesus was led into the wilderness, we, as the church, often find ourselves led into and needing to navigate challenging issues and make difficult decisions. Most would agree with me that we are currently in a "wilderness" of unseen before and difficult times due to major changes to our country's leadership and the resulting chaos that has ensued here in our country and abroad. All human rights and associated dignity seem to be in jeopardy and we must wonder to where can we turn. I look to Jesus's decisions in the wilderness as our best example for making sense of this world we are in. I will pose many of our concerns as questions for us to consider related to Jesus and our work as a church. I encourage you to spend time in personal reflection and prayer as we conclude our Lenten season, focusing on these themes.

CONSIDER: The Wilderness of Decision-Making (Matthew 4): Jesus faced temptations that tested his identity and his commitment to God's will. As church members, we are called to make decisions too that impact the life of our church and our neighbors as evidence of God's will at work in the world. SO...WE MIGHT ASK: How do we ensure that our decisions are rooted in prayer and discernment, rather than personal agendas or worldly pressures?

CONSIDER: the temptations Jesus faced:

- 1. Turning stones to bread (as in addressing immediate needs vs. trusting in what God provides),
- 2. Throwing himself from the temple (as in seeking validation through spectacle),
- 3. Bowing to Satan for worldly power (as in compromising faith for immoral convenience).

SO...WE MIGHT ASK: Where do we see these temptations mirrored in our own decision-making processes? How can we, like Jesus, use the Word of God to combat the temptations that arise within us?

CONSIDER: Bearing Fruit as Branches (John 15) Jesus reminds us that we are branches connected to the true vine, and that our ability to bear fruit depends on our abiding in him. As church members, we are called to be fruitful in our service to the church and our neighbors.SO...WE MIGHT ASK: What does it mean for us to "abide" in Christ? What kind of fruit are we called to bear as a church member? Are we bearing the fruit of the Spirit – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control? Or are we bearing the fruit of discord, stagnation, or self-interest? What are the dead branches that need to be pruned, so that the living branches can grow stronger?

MORE QUESTIONS WE MIGHT ASK: What are the "wilderness" experiences we are facing today? How can we better support one another in times of challenge and temptation? What practical steps can we take to deepen our connection with Christ and cultivate a spirit of prayer and discernment? How can we identify and prune the "dead branches" within our church? What fruits of the Spirit do we need to cultivate more intentionally in our roles as members of the church? How can we better ensure that our church is bearing fruit that glorifies God and serves the community?

PRAYER: Gracious God, as we conclude our journey through this season of Lent, we acknowledge our own wilderness experiences – times of doubt, temptation, and uncertainty. We ask that you guide us, as you guided Jesus, to rely on your Word and your Spirit. Open our hearts to your presence, and empower us to bear fruit that glorifies you, even in the midst of the many challenges we face. Amen.



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From Director of Music - Dr. Stephen Benscoter, CAGO

We are well into our Lenten journey. Pastor Amy said a few weeks ago that Lent reminds us of our need for God. It's a season of reflection, penance, and preparation for the Paschal promise, moving each week toward the silence after the closing of the book on Good Friday – all leading to Christ's resurrection on Easter Sunday. Lent is also a time rich in music that reflects the gravity of Christ's passion and our need for Christ's sacrifice. Through his death on the cross, we are freed to live out the Gospel. Our music becomes a powerful tool, providing space for prayer, contemplation, and interaction with God. As we continue in the final weeks of Lent, here are a few perspectives on moving from the triumph of Palm Sunday to the somber darkness of Good Friday.

Holy Week begins with Christ's glorious entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. The day starts with cries of "Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord" and the jubilant hymn "All Glory, Laud, and Honor," leading to the high point of the celebration. The crowds praise Christ as He rides into the city, and the music reflects this moment with triumphant organ music, congregational singing, and the waving of palms. But like that day so long ago, tensions linger, and the liturgy transitions to the Passion reading, the passion chorale, and a solemn postlude, foreshadowing the coming sacrifice.

As Lent progresses, our music shifts, focusing on Christ's last supper with the Apostles. From joyous praise to reflective tones, we sing hymns like "Where Charity and Love Prevail" and "It Happened on That Fateful Night." The most poignant part of the week is taking communion together, as the Apostles did, 12 at a time in a dark upper room, followed by the stripping of the altar, singing "Jesus, Remember Me."

Good Friday brings us to Golgotha, where Christ's sacrifice for the world is realized. Hymns like "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded," "Were You There?" and "Ah, Holy Jesus" mark the music of the Cross, reflecting Christ's sorrowful final moments. The crucifixion at Golgotha, "the place of the skull," is marked by silence in our liturgy, notably the absence of a postlude, underscoring the weight of Christ's death. Yet, even in this silence, the music of Lent tells a story of reverence and reflection.

Through its melodies and harmonies, Lent walks us through the tension between joy and sorrow, hope and despair. From the exuberant Hosannas of Palm Sunday to the stillness of Good Friday, the journey of Christ's passion and the solemnity of the Cross prepare us for the ultimate victory of Christ's resurrection on Easter Sunday. Blessings on your Journey this Lenten Season.





From Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center



Celebrating Black History Month at Hilltop

Children at the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center celebrated Black History Month in a wide variety of ways.

According to our Youth Services Coordinator, Teresa Allen, the older students concentrated on researching Black men and women of the labor movement from 1800.



"The project was researching different important members of the Labor Movement and then making a 3-panel poster displaying what they learned about the person they researched. We then set up the posters in the Gym for everybody to see, Some of the people we researched were A. Phillip Randolph, Bayard Rustin, Christian Smalls, and Velma Hopkins."

Meanwhile, our preschoolers took a different track. Curriculum Coordinator, Dashaba Fielder says some students dressed as their heroes.



"We had children dressed as Bessie Coleman, Rosa Parks, Jackie Robinson, and Ruby Bridges and they each were able to correctly recite a 'little known black history fact' on each of their persons. They enjoyed our Black On The Job Exhibit and (Hilltop Executive Director) Dr. Michele came dressed as Ruby Bridges as she read, The story of Ruby Bridges."

Back in February, we learned about the new Hilltop Food Pantry. Center Deputy Director, Brandon Furrowh tells us the pantry is popular.

"In the month of February, nine families sought out goods from the center's food pantry. Totaling 45 people, these nine families ranged from family sizes of as little as 2 members and as large as 8 members within the household. Popular items such as peanut butter, Kraft macaroni and cheese, tuna, spaghetti and spaghetti sauce are flying off the shelves."

At some point soon, Brandon says "Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center staff will solicit donations... with an understanding that many families will be negatively impacted by nation-wide cuts to programs that assist with food for under-employed families."

Center Executive Director, Michelle Willilams, updates us on the impact of possible Federal funding cuts to local non-profits.

"In the wake of last month's directive by the federal Office of Management and Budget to freeze funding and the ensuing court challenges to block implementation, nonprofit organizations have struggled to gain clarity and stability regarding the situation. While Hilltop has not been directly affected (emphasis added), some nearby nonprofits are discussing the potential impact which includes layoffs, no longer providing meals to seniors and scrapping

prospective partnerships with state agencies on infant early childhood mental health consultations. We will continue to watch for programs that affect the agency and the children and families such as Head Start, Medicaid and Social Security."


