

Building Update—Things Rolling Along

First off, the basement is just about completely done - Tom Krapf and his crew have done a great job getting everything done for us. The only holdup on the project is the room signs. Now, you might think, "Why would room signs hold up the completion of the project." Well, it's because one of those signs is the required "In case of fire use stairs not elevator" signs. That's a highly regulated piece of signage by the Fire Marshall and without the Fire Marshall approving the project, the county cannot do so either. The sign provider assured me and Tom personally that the signage would only take a matter of a few days . . . Well, it has turned out that is has taken them over 5 weeks. So, we're a bit upset about that. However, the signs should be here very soon. In the meantime, feel free to stroll down there (though you cannot use the elevator yet because while it works it does not have county approval to be used) and enjoy the space that we have created. We'll be working soon to empty the storage bins outside (lovingly nicknamed "the cows") and move everything in place.

As for the parking lot, you'll see that progress has been moving forward as the weather has improved. In the parking lot picture below, you'll see that the subsurface water management system has been installed and they are moving forward on getting things ready to construct the actual parking lot. We have about 35 working days left on this project . . . At least that's what we've been told. It's moving forward and should be done sometime in May or June . . . Just in time for our slower months . . . God does have a sense of humor!!!

One of the most powerful times, in my faith, was being in Confirmation Class. 
The same goes for them and the same goes for you.

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Amazing Grace/Abundant Grace

The original poem Amazing Grace was written in 1779 by Rev. John Newton. Before he was ordained in 1764, he was an outspoken atheist who worked on slave ships importing slaves to England. On one of Newton's voyages, a terrifying storm occurred at sea. On this trip, Newton prayed to his God for his life. This started him on his road to conversion, after which he became an abolitionist.

The US Library of Congress holds 3000 versions of the song Amazing Grace. What a wealth! I was introduced to the following verses when attending a yoga class provided through the Osher Long Life Learning Institute. As we worked through a Lunar Vinyasa to the tune of Amazing Grace, these words were sung. These lyrics are inspired by Jesus teachings of the Sermon on the Mount.

Abundant Grace rains down upon the humble, happy poor

To comfort all who grieve and mourn so they may mourn no more.

And blessed be the gentle meek all Earth they do receive.



Raised on a farm near Camden, South Carolina, Carroll's first music influences were church music and night-time radio. His mother was the church pianist and taught him his first chords on the guitar. Traditional southern gospel and bluegrass would give way to Jim Croce and James Taylor as he entered college. The first paying jobs paid college tuition but would pave the way for his life's work. He first tested the waters in New York but opted for Nashville, Tennessee. There, he worked with songwriters and music publishing and in various studios recording and helping produce nationally released records.

Family matters and money matters brought him back to South Carolina in 1981. He settled in Charleston, where he started a recording studio and music publishing business. A steady gig at the Mills House Hotel helped to pay for his growing family and the dream that refused to die. His family roots include Irish blood and his intense interest in the Irish music led to hosting annual visits to his ancestral homeland.










2025 Lutheran Community Services Room at the Table Event is May 7th

Books, Cats, and Cupcakes!

How's that for a description of this past month's activities at the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center?! Well, it's true.

The Center's Youth Services Program Coordinator, Teresa Allen, tells us that our students improved their reading skills with *Step into a Book* and a reading session called "Popcorn Reading."



"We chose a book entitled *If You Give a Cat a Cupcake*. The actual reading of the book was a YouTube video, and we had the children sit in front of the computer and listen to the reading of the book. While they were watching the video, we served them cheese popcorn and after the video we asked questions about the book and what they learned." Later, Teresa says "we also had free choice which allowed our students to choose any book they wanted to read in a casual way. The children really enjoyed this

theme and participated in the activities with a lot of smiling faces!"

The children didn't just learn about cats and cupcakes. Teresa says they also spent time discussing their emotions in an activity called Identifying Emotions.

"The activity was started by placing slips of paper with an emotion written on it in a jar and each person had to pick an emotion out the jar and then act it out. During the activity there was a lot of laughter, and the children had a good time with it. After we finished, the group returned to their seats and discussed how they could be more aware of other's feelings and do a better job of being kind!" Maybe something we could all use? Just sayin'....



There is a not so hidden goal to all of this activity. Teresa says "we have challenged our children to really concentrate on their reading skills and the goal is to get them as close to being able to read at their grade level as possible. We have come a long way to getting the children to really focus on what we're trying to accomplish."

Speaking of reading, our Summer Camp program is just a bit more than a month away, and planning is well underway. One of the goals of camp is to help the students to at least maintain their reading skills over the summer. To that end, Center Executive Director, Michelle Williams attended the *Summer Learning Matters: Together, We Make a Difference* event.

"The event was an incredible opportunity to celebrate the collective efforts of community-based organizations in combating the summer learning slide and to advocate for the continued resources needed to support summer learning programs. We were reminded of the power of leveraging the summer months to close the literacy gap."


