Building Update - One Project Done . . . One to Go . . . Or Two to Go?

The good news is that the basement is now completely done. The elevator is working and you can feel free to take a ride down to the basement anytime you want. I can tell you that I took my first ride down to the basement about a week ago and it was so much fun. I was so grateful to Tom Krapf and the other guys who did all the work to get that up and running. So, please, feel free to take a ride and explore the basement.

As for the parking lot, you'll see that progress has continued to move forward as the weather has improved. In the parking lot picture below, you'll see that the retaining wall has been constructed. Beneath that wall is the drain piping that leads from the parking lot surface to the subsurface water management system that was installed. There will also be a guard rail along the retaining wall at some point. You should see a few new things happening soon: continued grading of the lot, installation of curbs, and the installation of lighting. We have about 35 working days left on this project . . . At least that's what we've been told.

A third project you heard me say? Yes, last week, council approved a plan where we would install solar panels on the south roof/rooves. This will not cost the church anything as we are obtaining grants that will pay for the entire system. This should reduce our electric bills down to just about zero. We'll keep you posted on the progress of that project which should be completed sometime in the late summer/early fall.



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God has promised to make a home in those who show love towards one another. Honey Bees and Meditation

Have you ever had the opportunity to take a really close look at bees in and around a hive? Tending and observing bees can be quite spiritual. But first, let us address the obvious. I learned early on that honey bees are far more committed to carrying out their individual and collective missions than in sacrificing their lives stinging a mere human observer. My fascination with watching my backyard hive honey bees was matched only by the bees' lack of interest in me despite my very close proximity. Honey bees are busy and entirely focused on their assigned tasks. They reserve stinging for protecting the colony.

There is a certain reverence that comes with close observation of bees coming and going from the hive. Some bees are returning with their pollen and nectar bounty, while others are heading out, helped by sister bees offering directions to the best destinations. Some conversations are short, and some can go on for a minute or longer, involving antennae, heads, legs, entire body contact and singular bee dances that are as entertaining to observers as they are informational to their co-workers. The bees' vibrating wings in flight add another sensory element to the experience. There is a lot of activity, carefully coordinated, without an air traffic control tower. Bees are masters of organization, communication, coordination and service for the greater good. There are no distractions. Every action serves a purpose. Closely observing bees is a spiritual experience - a form of meditation unlike any other.

It doesn't take long to recognize that bees are a part of a larger entity, a living colony with its own purpose separate from the individual bees. Bees live for the good of the colony, not themselves. Each coordinated small act of service - each flight, each cell of wax and honey - builds something greater than any one bee can see. And no colony regardless of size can remotely come to understand mankind's dependence on these small remarkable creatures, pollinating Earth's plants and flowers. Without bees, humans - and countless animal species - would struggle to survive. We are all interdependent, interwoven. Observing bees easily translates into wonder and an appreciation for the incomprehensible organization of God's universe and the beauty of our home here on Earth. Pure love.

Observing the activities of bees quietly and respectfully serves as a form of meditation, an act of getting closer to God's magnificent creation. Daily visits provide a constant reminder that true spirituality is communal, not individualistic. God's handiwork is everywhere. By being quiet, respectful and observant with bees, it is possible to immerse oneself in the magnificence and wonder of God's work here on Farth.

Bees reflect a deep spiritual truth entirely consistent with Jesus' teachings: Life is most meaningful when it is purposeful, joyfully experienced in amazement, shared, and rooted in service and in love. Thank you Lord, for honey bees!

Raised on a farm near Camden, South Carolina, Carroll's first music influences were church music and night-time radio. His mother was the church pianist and taught him his first chords on the guitar. Traditional southern gospel and bluegrass would give way to Jim Croce and James Taylor as he entered college. The first paying jobs paid college tuition but would pave the way for his life's work. He first tested the waters in New York but opted for Nashville, Tennessee. There, he worked with songwriters and music publishing and in various studios recording and helping produce nationally released records.

Family matters and money matters brought him back to South Carolina in 1981. He settled in Charleston, where he started a recording studio and music publishing business. A steady gig at the Mills House Hotel helped to pay for his growing family and the dream that refused to die. His family roots include Irish blood and his intense interest in the Irish music led to hosting annual visits to his ancestral homeland.

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Last month members of the Pinners and Knotters visited Nemours Children's Hospital in Wilmington to deliver our donation of 23 quilts and 129 activity bags. These bags are used by children and parents alike to hold items they use during trips to hospital, including toys, etc. The staff relayed to us the pleasure these items give the children.

Outreach Update

As noted in a previous Guidepost update, any extra support we might be able to give to the service organizations in our local community, our country, or the wider world would no doubt be much appreciated in these turbulent times, whether it be financial or donations of time or goods. Our own Grocery Club, the food pantries of Lutheran Community Services, Family Promise of Delaware, JFS Delaware, Global Refuge (formerly Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service), Lutheran World Relief and many more worthy organizations are out there every day serving those who are in need.

This month, Emma Wagner shares some thoughts about how Lutheran World Relief continues to serve people in great need around the world, even as federal funding for humanitarian relief is in doubt. At the Room at the Table event on May 7th, Lutheran Community Services shared its excitement at the grand opening of its new LCS Food Hub, a warehouse/fulfillment center next to its main facility on Baynard Blvd in Wilmington. The Food Hub will support the Delaware Food Farmacy program, other nutrition security programs, and the existing LCS pantry network that serves over 50,000 people a year. LCS is working with its strong network of partners and volunteers to navigate these uncertain times, where LCS expects ever greater numbers of people in need at the same time federal support to help meet these needs decreases.



EIGHTY YEARS OF FAITH IN ACTION!

Eighty years ago, our Lutheran forebearers had a vision to join together and be the Body of Christ in the world, responding boldly to the needs of our neighbors in Europe after World War II.

As I think about what needs our neighbors have today, I can't help but think of a recent statistic I read: in 2024, nearly 350 million people around the world were facing acute hunger. And that number is growing. Due to rising conflict, climate disruptions, and dramatic cuts to U.S. foreign assistance, we may soon reach the heartbreaking milestone of **half a billion people**—half a billion—who don't have enough to eat.

These numbers are so big that they quickly become abstract. So let's put it in perspective. Imagine the entire population of **New York City**—every single person—struggling to find food for themselves and their children. Now multiply that not by 2, or 10, or even 20... but by **43 more cities the size of New York**. That's the scale of suffering we're talking about right now. It hardly feels like the time to celebrate anything.

And yet this year—2025—marks the 80th anniversary of Lutheran World Relief. And as strange as it may sound, *this* is exactly the kind of moment that calls us to remember where we came from.

LWR was founded in **1945**. The world was still reeling from the Great Depression. World War II had just ended. There was devastation here at home and across the globe. The instinct could have been to turn inward. To circle the wagons, and to say, "We have enough problems of our own."

But that's not what happened. Instead, U.S. Lutherans—our parents and grandparents in faith—chose to look *outward*. They heard about people across Europe who were hungry and homeless. And instead of saying, "Not our problem," they said, "Let's help."

That's our legacy. Not fear, but faith in action. Not retreat, but resurrection courage.

Now 80 years later, Lutherans across the United States are still joining together in faith to share God's love with the world. Thank you for joining us this year and in the future to continue our Lutheran legacy of love.



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Audits and Bowling and Books...Oh My!

With the pending close of the school year, the students and staff of the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center are gearing up for yearend assessments and audits. But there's still lots of fun happing at the Center. Youth Services Coordinator, Teresa Allen, tells us that one of the audits was around reading skills. Teresa is happy to report that, over the year, most of the children improved those skills!



"During our process, we first administered a pre-assessment test in the fall to measure their reading level and to give each child a starting point. Each child was then given a reading log at the beginning of each month with their reading level scores recorded at the top. The goal," according to Teresa, "was to have each child read at least 5 books or more each month on their reading level or higher. Every book read was recorded on their reading log. At the end of the month all logs were collected and tracked. This process was done from Octo-

ber (pre-assessment test) through April when the Post Assessment tests were given. The post testing showed some improvement for all children who participated."

Congratulations to all students!

Meanwhile, Center Executive Director, Michelle Williams, says government audits are underway. "They observed lunch in the infant and toddler 1 classrooms. They also interviewed Mr. Ron (cook), inspected the food pantry and reviewed documents. The desk review will occur via Microsoft Teams in the near future." In addition, Michelle says the "State Funded Pre-K also conducted an unannounced visit on April 29th. They reviewed 20 files and interviewed me. They asked questions pertaining to eligibility, recruitment, selection, waiting lists, inclusion in classrooms and staff credentials."

So, you may ask, where's the fun in any of that? Well, according to Center Deputy Director, Brandon Furrowh, the Center recently held its first father-son bowling tournament.

"The Bowling Buddies event was designed to shine a light on father-son relationships while, incorporating into the fun, the urgency to build up our young boys through positive communication and modeling. The 28 participants who attended," Brandon explains, "received t-shirts, swag bags, food, and more. The three winners (one per allotted age group) walked away with a \$100 gift card to either Footlocker, Main Event, or Cinemark Movies. The verbal feedback for the event expressed gratitude, fun, and a desire to continue events such as this."



Finally, Brandon reports that the Center staff also celebrated outstanding foster grandparents. "Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center, as an organization, was acknowledged and celebrated for being a faithful participating organization for over 53 years. The AmeriCorps Seniors Delaware Foster Grandparents Program recognized Hilltop's foster grandparents for their contribution to the center. The event included speeches, awards, lunch, pictures, and dancing." And Brandon had his picture taken with Governor Matt Meyer!
